Norton boys take victory over Oberlin, 48-42

with a 48-42 victory. The Blue Jays led by just 11-10 after the first quarter and the score was tied at 24-all at halftime. The Red Devils couldn't buy a basket in the third period which ended with them adding just two more field goals to their total and falling behind the visitors 36-28.

The fourth quarter was evenly played which worked out well for the Blue Jays.

"We didn't play very well on either end of the court," said coach Reusink. "They have good shooters but I didn't think we did a very good job of guarding them.

"Offensively, we didn't shoot as well as we have and we struggled mentally when that was happening.

"It was nice to get the win and run our record to 10-5."

Norton's senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier was hard for the Red Devils to stop around the basket and he hit 8 of 12 two-point shots for 67 percent accuracy. He was a perfect 2 of 2 from the free throw line to finish with 18 points.

The Blue Jays' other double figure scorer was senior guard Zach Hartwell, who continued to rip the nets from long range. Hartwell hit 4 of 8 shots from beyond the arc for 50 percent and 12 points.

Junior guard Jacob Brooks added 9 points on 1 of 6 long range shots for 17 percent, 3 of 6 two-point tries for 50 percent and 4 of 12 overall for 33 per-

The Red Devils hit 6 of 19 long range shots for 32 percent, 11 of 33 two-point attempts for 33 percent and 17 of 52 overall for 33 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton connected on 3 of 4 for 75 percent and the Red Devils hit 2 of 3 for 67 percent.

Norton outrebounded Oberlin 34-24. The Blue Jays pulled down 12 offensive and 22 defensive caroms and the Red Devils grabbed 9 offensive and 15 defensive boards.

Leading rebounder for Norton was Wahlmeier with another double-double as he pulled down 11 rebounds. He was followed by Dillon McConney with 7; Brooks, 5; Alec Gilgenbach, 4; Tye Nickell, 2; Hartwell, 2; Andrew Ellis, 2; Joe LeClair, 1.

Wahlmeier put on another blocking clinic as he rejected 5 Oberlin shots!
