Norton wrestlers headed for regional tourney

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School wrestling team will compete in the Class 3-2-1A Regional Wrestling Tournament this Friday and Saturday in Lakin.

As usual, this regional tournament will be the toughest of the four in the state. Six of the top 10 ranked teams in the state will be among the 24 teams competing. They are: Goodland, No.1; Scott City, No.2; Hoxie, No.3; Oberlin, No.4; Plainville, No. 7 and Phillipsburg, No. 10.

Other teams competing, in addition to Norton and Lakin, will be: Atwood, Cimarron, Elkhart, Ellis, Thomas More Prep-Hays, Hill City, Holcomb, Leoti, Meade, Montezuma, Oakley, Quinter, St. Francis, Stockton, Sublette and Trego Community.

A total of 32 of the 90 state ranked individual wrestlers are expected to

next week's state tournament in Hays.

"This year's regional tournament is going to be tough as always," said Norton head wrestling coach Bill Johnson. "I hate to sound like a broken record from year to year but it is going to be very difficult to qualify wrestlers out of this regional tournament for the state tournament.

"Six of the top 10 teams in the state have been assigned to the Lakin regional. But, that is out of my control and I refuse to waste any of my time complaining about it. What I can control is preparing my team to beat the best in the state. That is our focus. We know it is going to be tough and we are ready for the challenge."

The top four finishers in each weight class in each of the four regionals qualifies for next weekend's State Tournament in Hays.

The tournament will begin on Friday with the first round at 2 p.m., followed by the championship quarterfinals, approximately 20 minutes after round 1; consolation first round, approximately 20 minutes after round 2 and championship semifinals, approximately 20 minutes after round 3.

Wrestling will continue Saturday at 11 a.m. with the consolation cross bracketing, followed by the consolation quarterfinals, approximately 20 minutes later; consolation semifinals, immediately after lunch; consolation finals, approximately 20 minutes after; championship finals, immediately following the consolation finals.

Plaques will be awarded to the top two teams and medals to the top four wrestlers in each weight.

Admission is \$4 for K-12, \$5 for adults, Friday; \$6 for K-12, \$8 for adults, Saturday.

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com With only senior guard Zach Hartwell hitting three-point baskets, the Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team relied on two-point shots and plenty of free throws to defeat Atwood 65-50 in nonleague play on Friday in the NCHS Stull Gym in Norton.

Norton got off to a good start with a 20 point first quarter as Hartwell hit a trey, junior guard Jacob Brooks hit his only threepoint basket of the night as well as a two-pointer senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier connected on two field goals and 4 of 4 from the free throw line and senior guard Tye Nickell swished a basket and two charities. Atwood scored just 10 points on 5 baskets in the quar-

The Blue Jays had four players in double scoring figures. Wahlmeier hit 6 of 10 two-point shots for 60 percent and was 8 of 13 from the charity stripe for 62 percent and 20 total points.

Nickell used his success at the free throw line to end with 16 points. He was 3 of 8 from twopoint land for 38 percent but swished 10 of 12 free throws for 83 percent accuracy.

Brooks scored 13 points on 1 of 5 from long range for 20 percent, 5 of 10 two-point tries for 50 percent and 6 of 15 overall for 40 percent.

ter. The Blue Jays were unable to stretch the lead in the second quarter where they outscored the Buffaloes by only 14-13. Brooks hit three more baskets, Hartwell buried another three-pointer and free throw and Nickell and senior guard Dillon McConney each hit a basket.

Norton's lowest scoring quarter was the third where they tallied just 11 points but Atwood hit just 12. Hartwell hit his third basket from beyond the arc for a perfect 3 of 3 for the night while Nickell, Brooks, Wahlmeier and junior forward Andrew Ellis each hit a basket.

Thanks to 14 out of 17 free throws in the final stanza, Norton outscored Atwood 20-15 to extend the final margin of victory to 15 points. Nickell was a perfect 8 of 8 from the charity stripe, Wahlmeier was 4 of 7 and McConney was 2 for 2. Wahlmeier also finished with three more field goals.

"We did play well although we weren't able to pull away until the fourth quarter," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink.

"We got some good looks offensively in the third quarter and just couldn't buy a basket. We had a size mismatch with them being so much bigger but we did a good job against them most of the time. When we weren't in the right spot defensively, they hurt us.

'We will have to be ready to play Tuesday when we host a good Hoxie team."

Norton extended their season record to 11-5 while Atwood fell to 10-6.

Hartwell hit 10 points on the strength of his 3 of 3 from beyond the arc for 100 percent and 1 of 2 from the charity stripe.

Leading scorer for the Buffaloes was 6'5" sophomore James Peterson with 15 points.

As a team, Norton hit 4 of 14 from long range for 29 percent, 16 of 37 two-point shots for 43 percent and 20 of 51 overall for 40 percent.

Atwood hit 2 of 5 treys for 40 percent, 15 of 44 two-point tries for 34 percent and 17 of 49 overall for 35 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton was 21 of 32 for 66 percent and Atwood was 14 of 22 for 64 percent.

Norton outrebounded Atwood 29-26. The Blue Jays pulled down 11 offensive and 18 defensive caroms while the Buffaloes grabbed 9 offensive and 17 defensive boards.

McConney led Norton in rebounds with 8, followed by Brooks, 7; Wahlmeier, 5; Joe LeClair, 3; Dalton Miller, 3; Nickell, 2; Hartwell, 1.

Wahlmeier continued to block opponents' shots, rejecting 4.
