News from your legislator **Ward Cassidy**



There is now a House tax plan, a Senate tax plan, and the Governor's proposed tax plan. One part of the House Plan that I like is the proposal to allow .6 cents of the 2010 penny sales tax increase to expire in 2013. The Governor's plan is to renew the full 1 cent sales tax. If the money in the state coffers continues to come in, reducing the sales tax would benefit a lot of people. The Kansas Department of Transportation would keep the .4 cent of the 2010 penny sales tax increase under both the House and Governor's plan. What I don't like, in the House plan, relates to the Kansas Department of Transportation. It would freeze KDOT spending for two years. The House tax committee said that the fund would be restored and that KDOT would not lose any dollars in the long run. The transportation bill gives about eight million dollars a year to each of my counties, and I can't support putting that on hold. I have also seen where the legislature says they will return funds—and then something changes over time.

I have received many e-mails about keeping the Kansas Community Service Tax Credit Program. I feel that the credit has been very valuable, to our area, and I have been working to ensure that it becomes a part of any tax plan. The House plan does keep current tax credits and deductions the same as they now are.

As if we needed any more issues, HB 2353 was passed out of committee. This would allow concealed carry permit holders to carry in all public buildings such as libraries, hospitals, and college campuses, unless all entrances to those buildings have metal detectors. I have a concealed carry license, but I will have trouble supporting the cost and dangers involved with this bill. I never thought I could oppose any bill relating to our 2nd amendment, but I am planning to oppose this

This week, the Governor issued his first Executive Reorganization Order (ERO) of the 2012 legislative session. ERO 41 would propose the following: consolidating the financing arm of Medicaid in KDHE Division of Health Care Finance, renaming the Department on Aging as the Department for Aging and Disability Services, consolidating all disability waiver and mental health services from SRS into the new Department for Aging and Disability Services, and renaming SRS as the Department for Children and Families.

If neither chamber rejects this ERO within sixty days of receiving it, it will go into effect July 1, 2012. Despite the many concerns from advocates and interested parties, the Governor's office contends that there is no stopping it now. I would say that this topic is the one that dominates my calls and e-mails.

We were given a very disturbing fact today in committee: today in America, there are nearly twice as many people working for the government (22.5 m) than in all of manufacturing (11.5 m). This is almost an exact reversal of the situation in 1960: 15m in manufacturing and 8.7m in government. You can draw your own conclusions from this.

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
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
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Homeopathic remedies using honey
