Sophomore guard Katelyn Engelbert also swished a shot from three-point range along with a two-point basket and senior post Caren Thomson scored on a two-point attempt. Senior post Erin Terrell added a free throw.

On the strength of two threepoint baskets, Hill City out-

scored Norton 11-8 in the second quarter but the Lady Jays still had a comfortable 24-15 lead at intermission.

Terrell hit two baskets in the quarter and sophomore post Bailey Ambrosier and Griffey each hit one two-pointer.

The third quarter was a defensive one in which Hill City had a 6-2 advantage but Norton still led 26-21 with one quarter remaining. Norton's only points in the period came on a basket by Terrell.

Four different girls scored for the Lady Jays in the hard-fought final stanza where both teams scored 12 points.

Engelbert hit two baskets and two free throws, Terrell and junior guard Kamilla Jones each swished a basket and Griffey added two free throws.

"That was the hardest we've played all year," said a happy Norton head girls basketball coach Kevin Jilka. "We were very proud of the effort of our players, especially after the last

"Offensively, the first half we were really good; in the second half we stood around but we made some plays when we

"Defensively, it was by far our best effort. Our girls really got after it all night long.

"We don't have much time to rest since we go to Ellis on Friday and we will need the same effort."

With the win, Norton evened their season record at 9-9.

Griffey led Norton in scoring with 12 points on 2 of 4 from long range for 50 percent, 2 of 8 two-point attempts for 25 percent, 4 of 12 overall for 33 percent and 2 of 2 free throws for 100 percent.

Engelbert was right behind her with 11 points on 1 of 1 from beyond the arc for 100 percent, 3 of 12 two-point tries for 25 percent, 4 of 13 overall for 31 percent and 2 of 3 charities for 67 percent.

Terrell added 9 points on 4 of 13 from the field for 31 percent and 1 of 2 free throws for 50

## Blue Jay varsity loses close game to Hill City, 54-52

The Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team played well enough to win against Mid-Continent League foe Hill City on the Ringnecks' home court in a makeup game Thursday evening but a basket at the end allowed the home team to escape with a 54-52 win.

There were several ties in the game but Norton was ahead most of the

Hill City took a 47-45 lead on a three point basket by Adam Pfeifer late in the game but senior guard Tye Nickell answered with his only trey of the game and junior guard Jacob Brooks followed with a two-point basket that put Norton back in the lead by 50-47 with 3:36 left in the contest.

After a Hill City basket, Brooks stole the ball and drove for a layup to make it 52-49 at the 1:32 mark.

Solomon Wilson answered for the Ringnecks with a two-point basket that cut the Norton lead to 52-51 and he followed that with a 3 point basket with 2 seconds left that hit nothing but net and

to a 54-52 win, breaking the hearts of the large Blue Jay crowd!

"It was a tough loss," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink, who saw his team fall to 11-7 for the year. Hill City is now 13-4 for the season, which is winding down.

"Hill City has a good team but we made some dumb plays on the offensive end down the stretch.

"We competed and played hard but just didn't play very smart."

The Blue Jays got off to a great start by outscoring Hill City 20-13 in the first quarter. Junior guard Jacob Brooks hit a trey and two two-point baskets, senior guard Zach Hartwell drained a three-pointer, senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier and senior guard Tye Nickell each hit a basket and free throw and senior guard Dillon McConney and junior forward Andrew Ellis each hit a basket.

It turned out to be Norton's best scoring quarter of the game.

Wahlmeier led the way for the Blue Jays in the second quarter when he threw in three two-point baskets and a trey and Brooks and Ellis each hit a

suddenly propeled the Hill City quintet basket for 13 Norton points. Hill City scored 16 in the period but Norton still led 33-29.

## Norton boys basketball loses to Ellis in final league game

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School boys basketball team played hard at Ellis on Friday night but the Railroaders stayed enough ahead of them the entire game to win 52-45 in the final Mid-Continent League game of the season.

Ellis outscored Norton 14-11 in the first quarter and 13-6 in the second period to lead 27-17 at intermission.

The Blue Jays' best quarter was the third when they outscored the Railroaders 17-12 to cut the Ellis advantage to 39-34. Junior guard Jacob Brooks, who had not scored since hitting two baskets in the first quarter, buried two shots from beyond the arc in the third period to give the Blue Jay offense a spark. Also hitting three two-point baskets in the same quarter was senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier, who played spar-

ingly after an injury in the first half and had not yet scored. Senior guard Tye Nickell also hit a three-point and two-point basket in the third quarter.

Most of Norton's offense in the final stanza came from Brooks, who hit another trey and three two-point baskets for 9 of the Blue Jays' 11 points but it wasn't enough to catch the Railroaders who hit 13 more points to win by seven.

"We played hard and battled hard but faced adversity when Wahlmeier went out early in the game," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink. "But our players stepped up.

"We had some lapses after making some good plays and forced some things but I can't fault our effort. We competed but just didn't play our best."

Brooks finished with 19 points on 3 of 8 from beyond the arc for 38 percent, 5 of 8 two-point attempts for 63 percent and 8 of
