Blue Jays lose final game of regular season play

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team played one exceptional quarter on Tuesday night but it didn't help enough to allow them to outscore the visiting Colby quintet who defeated them 55-44 in the regular season finale on Tuesday evening in the NCHS Stull Gym.

The Blue Jays dug a hole in the first quarter when they scored just 6 points on two baskets from beyond the arc by senior guard Zach Hartwell while the Eagles poured in 17 points.

The second quarter was the good one for the home team as they tallied 20 points compared to 13 by the visitors to cut Colby's halftime lead to 30-26

Senior guard Tye Nickell hit 9 points on a trey, two two-point baskets and 2 of 3 free throws. Junior guard Jacob Brooks also buried a three-pointer and a two-point basket as well as 1 of 2 charities for 8 points.

Junior guard Dalton Miller hit a basket and 1 of 2 from the charity stripe and Hartwell added 2 of 2 free tosses.

After the hot shooting second quarter, the Blue Jays offense cooled off in the third quarter and was only able to produce 5 more points compared to 12 for Colby and Norton trailed 42-31 with just one quarter remain-

Norton's only third period points came on baskets by senior guard Dillon McConney and junior guard Carson McKenna and 1 of 2 charities from

The fourth quarter was better, thanks to three baskets and

a free throw from Brooks, two more baskets by McKenna and one basket by McConney for 13 points, which was too little, too late, however, with the Eagles also tallying 13 points.

Norton senior power forward Jordan Wahlmeier, who was injured in the Ellis game on Friday night, did not play in the game.

"We're not playing very well right now," said Norton head boys basketball coach Doug Reusink. "We played hard and had good defense but I was disappointed that some of our boys had the opportunity to pick up the slack for Wahlmeier's absence and didn't.'

Jacob Brooks was leading scorer for Norton with 13 points on 1 of 4 from trey distance for 25 percent, 4 of 9 two-point tries for 45 percent, 5 of 13 overall for 39 percent and 2 of 3 from the charity stripe for 67

Also scoring in double figures was senior guard Tye Nickell who hit 10 points on 1 of 3 from beyond the arc for 33 percent, 2 of 9 two-point attempts for 22 percent, 3 of 12 overall for 25 percent and 3 of 5 free throws for 60 percent.

Leading Colby was Todd Kane with 14 points.

As a team, Norton swished 4 of 17 from long range for 24 percent, 12 of 33 two-point attempts for 36 percent and 16 of 50 overall for 32 percent.

Colby hit 1 of 9 trey tries for 11 percent, 21 of 39 two-point tries for 54 percent and 22 of 48 overall for 46 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton was 8 of 16 for 50 percent and Colby hit 10 of 18 for

Both teams pulled down 24 rebounds. Norton grabbed 13 offensive and 11 defensive caroms and Colby had 7 offensive and 17 defensive boards.

Brooks led Norton in rebounds with 8, followed by McKenna and Nickell, 4 each; Miller, 3; McConney and Andrew Ellis, 2 each; Alec Gilgenbach, 1.

Gilgenbach also blocked 1 Colby shot.

Norton had 9 steals compared to 7 by Colby. Nickell led in steals with 3, followed by Brooks, 2; Hartwell, McConney, Ellis, McKenna, 1 each.

The Blue Jays were credited with 8 offensive assists and Colby had 6. McKenna was assists leader with 3, followed by Mc-Conney, 2; Nickell, Hartwell, Miller, 1 each.

Norton had 11 turnovers and Colby lost the ball 15 times.
