Lady Jays conclude 2011-2012 basketball season

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Kevin Jilka's Norton Community High School girls basketball team was very competitive in the recently concluded 2011-12 season and provided the Blue Jay fans with many exciting moments.

They played some of the best teams in the state and never backed down, playing their hardest all the time.

"We had a good year," said coach Jilka. "Obviously, there were some games we felt we could have won but that is the way it goes.

"There is a good nucleus coming back with three starters and nine letter winners so things look good for next year. Our girls must get better between now and next November by work in the weight room and playing games."

This year's team had four returning starters and five more letter winners. The starters from last year were Erin Terrell, 5'10" senior post; Caren Thomson, 5'7" senior post; Tawni Griffey, 5'5" junior point guard and Kamilla Jones, 5'8" junuor guard.

Griffey and Terrell returned as the two highest scorers, Griffey averaging 12.6 points per game and Terrell with an 11.6 points per game average.

Assistant coaches again this season were George Rossi and Joan Bolt and Brian Henry returned as student manager.

Norton opened the season as the Lady Jays have in recent years by competing in the annual Topside Tip-Off Tournament in Goodland. In their opener, Norton played an excellent Sharon Springs quintet and was outscored 32-23 by the eventual Class 1A-II Kansas State champions. Griffey led Norton in scoring with 14 points.

A second quarter scoring drought hurt in a 52-42 loss to Wray, Colo., where Griffey scored 16 points. The Lady Jays were victorious in their third game of the tournament by a 56-42 score over host team Goodland to place seventh. Griffey scored 23 points which included hitting 4 of 5 shots from beyond the arc for 80 percent accuracy. Sophomore guard Katelyn Engelbert added 12 points.

"It was by far our best game of the tournament," said coach Jilka. "We got better each game."

On Friday, Dec. 16, Norton got Mid-Continent League play underway at Phillipsburg versus a very good Lady Panther quintet and lost 46-19. Griffey scored 7 points and Teslee Nickell, junior guard, added 6 points. Norton would play Phillipsburg two more times in the season and gave them good, close games each time.

Norton traveled out of state to Cambridge, Neb. on Tuesday, Dec. 20 and the Lady Jays returned with a 39-29 victory. "We played hard and a lot more physical than we have been," said coach Jilka. "Offensively, we were more patient and took better shots and defensively it was our best effort as we blocked out on rebounds."

Thomson led the way with 11 points and 6 rebounds.

Norton opened the new year by hosting Osborne in Mid-Continent League action on Friday, Jan. 6. The Lady Jays fell behind in the first half but played the visitors even in the second half in a 52-41 loss. Griffey scored 15 points and Terrell returned after an earlier injury and threw in 11 points.

On Monday, Jan. 9, No.6 seeded Norton traveled to play No.3 seeded Phillipsburg in the Mid-Continent League Tournament first round. Norton played Phillipsburg on even terms until they pulled away at the end to win 45-37. Griffey scored 12 points and Terrell added 11.

Needless to say, it was a much closer game than the 27-point loss earlier in the season. "I was very proud of our girls' effort," said coach Jilka.

Norton hosted Ellis in Mid-Continent League Tournament consolation bracket play on Thursday, Jan. 12 in the NCHS Stull Gym. Ellis was the No.7 seed and had lost to Hill City in the first round.

The Lady Jays played a solid game on both offense and defense to defeat the Lady Railroaders 42-31. Eight different girls scored for Norton led by Terrell and Thomson, each with 8 points.

On Saturday, Jan. 14, Norton played their final game of the tournament in Gross Memorial Coliseum in Hays. The Lady Jays avenged the earlier 52-41 loss to Osborne with a 45-43 win over the Lady Bulldogs to place fifth in the tournament. The win over Osborne was not as close as the score might indicate. Norton led 45-36 with 1:31 remaining in the game but Osborne scored the final 7 points. Terrell was leading scorer for Norton with 12 points.

The makeup game with Hill City was played on Thursday, Feb. 16 in Hill City and the Lady Jays got back on the winning side with an impressive 38-33 victory over the Lady Ringnecks on their home court. Griffey tallied 12 points and Engelbert hit 11 as Norton evened their record at 9 and 9.

"It was the hardest we've played all year," said coach Jilka. "We are very proud of the effort of our players.'

The very next night, Norton traveled to Ellis for a regularly scheduled Mid-Continent League contest. This time, the Lady Railroaders got revenge for their loss to Norton in the MCL tournament by outscoring the Lady Jays 38-26. Norton hit only 23 percent on field goal attempts. Terrell hit 8 points and Engelbert added 7.

"I was disappointed in our play after we did a great job in all areas in beating Hill City," said coach Jilka.

On Tuesday, Feb. 21, Norton hosted Colby in non-league play in the NCHS Stull Gym and was no match for the Lady Eagles in all categories as the Class 4A visitors prevailed 58-26. Griffey led Norton in scoring with 8 points.

It was "Senior Night" for Norton. Seniors honored with their parents were players Erin Terrell and Caren Thomson, student manager Bryan Henry, cheerleader Rhees Carlson and dance team members Brae Bigge, Mariah Farber and Kylie Nuzum.

The Class 3A Sub-State Tournament was next and Norton was seeded No.6 which meant another game versus No.3 seeded Phillipsburg on the Lady Panthers' home court on Tuesday, Feb. 28.

Norton had played much better in the second meeting of the two teams and played even better this time around. The fired up Lady Jays, knowing the end of the season was on the line, came out shooting and hitting and stormed to a 14-4 lead in the first quarter..
