Road work will require detour

Beginning approximately April 2, the Kansas Department of Transportation will begin work to replace a concrete drainage structure located two miles west of Zurich on K-18 in Rooks County.

Travelers will be routed onto an official state detour while the structure is being replaced. The

detour route is as follows: From the U.S. 183/K-18 Junction north to the U.S. 24 Junction in Stockton, west to the U.S. 24/K-18 Junction north of Bogue.

The closure spans less than 1/2 mile on K-18 Highway at the culvert location. The rest of the route will remain open to local traffic.

Please use caution, pay attention to the work zone signs, and respect workers when driving through any road construction zone. Slow down and "Give 'Em A Brake".

Weather permitting the construction work will be completed by this June.

A "Breastfeeding: The Wide Range of Normal" continuing education class will be held in April in Junction City.

This class will examine evidence-based strategies to minimize and manage predictable lactation-related crisis during the first days postpartum. This class will discuss causes and remedies for early breast and nipple pain; early and continuous skin contact, rooming-in, and the community system for triaging breastfeeding problems.

the Business Case for Breastfeeding, through the Kansas Breastfeeding Coalition, Inc. She currently serves as the La Leche League USA representative to the United States Breastfeeding Committee and the Area Professional Liaison for La Leche League of Kansas.

The "Turpin Tyme Ragsters," a seven piece ragtime music ensemble based in Kansas City, will perform at the Oberlin Gateway at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday.

The group recreates, from the original arrangements, the ragtime sounds of composers Scott Joplin, James Scott, Charles Johnson, Joseph Lamb, Eubie Blake, "Jelly Roll" Morton, Tom Turpin (their namesake) along with many others. They hope to "turn back the clocks," musically, to an era of ceiling fans, ice cream socials and Sunday concerts in the park.

The Ragsters' repertoire reflects the diversity of music from "turn of the century" America, including songs like "Dill Pickles", "The Entertainer", "Easy Winners", "Alexander's Ragtime Band", "Tiger Rag", "The Chrysanthemum", "Peaceful Henry", "12th Street Rag", "Ragtime Dance", and many more.

They have added a wealth of new musical material since they last performed in Oberlin. Their musical presentation unfolds with toe tapping ragtime songs, with historical information and humor provided. In 2008, they were featured artists at

the prestigious Scott Joplin International Ragtime Festival in Sedalia, Mo.
