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With 8 percent of registered voters participating in Tuesday's election, three un-opposed candidates have been elected to the Norton City Council.

The Norton County Clerk's office reported Wednesday that candidate Harriett Gill from Ward I received 43 votes, candidate Donna Foley (incumbant) from Ward II received 49 votes and Ron Briery from Ward III received 46 votes.

The election results will not be official until the Norton County Commissioners canvass the results, which is slated for Monday morning at 9 a.m.

Along with the Norton city elections, three new members have been named to the Lenora City Council after Tues-

Of the five at-large council seats in Lenora, three were up for re-election and four candidates filed for those three

Taking those seats were Andrea Day (32 votes), Deborah Anderson (26 votes) and Phillip Rule (23 votes). Carla Burch received 12 votes and 19 percent of the city's register voters turned out for the election.

We've Got Jobs: Norton County Hospital

Editor's Note: The following is part of a series of stories from the Norton Telegram's "We've Got Jobs" feature. The monthly segment features local companies that are growing and expanding the local employee base while supporting Norton County economy.

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Already one of the largest employees in the county, Norton County Hospital leaders are still looking to the future and the possibility of expanding the hospital's workforce.

Hospital administrator Rich Miller reported recently that Norton County Hospital employs about 135 full and part-time employees, about half of which are in the medical field.

Along with Human Resources Director Shannan Hempler, Miller reported that the hospital is currently recruiting for a respirtory therapist, but isn't actively recruiting for other specific positions. Hempler explained that the hospital has recently filled positions in human resources, billing, housekeeping and support staff. In addition, a new position was recently created for an Information Technology Director, a position that wasn't even a part of the hospital staff until this year.

Even without specific open positions, however, hospital leaders are anticipating needing to add staff in the near future, especially as Norton County Hospital expands its service area.

We are trying to ensure the availability of nurses because there has been a nursing shortage," Miller explained. "As we continue to build our relationship with Colby Community College, we anticipate hiring nurses who graduate from the college's nursing pro-

Miller and Hempler emphasized that one of the most appealing aspects of employment at the hospital is stability. Miller said that a majority of the hospital staff have several years of tenure with the facility, but also a good mix of

people who are new to the hospital. "We provide stable employment here, but it's always nice to get fresh ideas and fresh perspectives," Miller said. "We have a nice balance of longtime employees and younger, newer employees."

Miller explained that the hospital is always accepting resumes and job applications for all positions in the hospital and leaders are looking for a few specific characteristics in potential employees. Applicants should be mature,

stable and most of all, committing to providing quality healthcare.

"All of our employees, from the administrator to the housekeeping staff are dedicated to teamwork and the mission of caring for the community," Miller said. "Those are qualities expect from all of our employees and looked for in potential new employees."

Anyone who is interested in applying for a position at Norton County Hospital can do so in a variety of ways. Job vacancies are posted at the hospital's website, www.ntcohosp.com and applications can be picked up in person or applications can be distributed by email, fax or postal mail.

Hempler explained that the hospital is a KPERS employer and offers paid leave and insurance benefits, perks not offered from every employer, especially in a small, rural community. While certification and training is required for many of the positions at the hospital, Miller and Hempler said that often, employees join the hospital staff, then go on for certifications and higher education to fit the needs of their jobs.

Regardless of the position, however, employees can expect a stable work environment at Norton County Hospital.

"I like the stability of our staff because there isn't a lot of turnover," Miller said, "but we are also aware that the future will bring new and different needs, so we are always looking for employees who are dedicated to caring for our community."
