Three adventurous men and their two dogs, Smokey Joe and Happy, set out on May 2 for a 30-day trip from St. Francis headed to the three corners of Kansas, Missouri and Oklahoma.

Over a year ago, Frank Nettleton and Frank Burkdoll, both of Lyndon, found an interesting item while driving through St. Francis. It was a 5,100-pound wagon, owned by Larry Forsythe. After negotiations the two Franks bought it and a year later, the three men have come together with their team of four, 8-10 year old Haflinger horses to find adventure.

Lalanna weighs in at 960 pounds, Doc at 1,080 pounds, Maggie at 1,060 pounds and Queenie at 880 pounds. Burkdoll's answer to why they were doing this was "Why not? There is nothing

to get too excited about, life is too short for all the hills we make for ourselves."

The threesome had nothing but good things to say about the wonderful people they had met as they traveled to the little town of Norton. Nettleton said that they average between 18-20 miles a day, never pushing the animals too hard and tying them out at night to graze.

"We prepared all winter for this, we organized it like the military by having a routine to follow," Nettleton explained.

The wagon is set up with four air-ride captains chairs, turning signals, a restroom and a kitchen area. The group continued on toward Phillipsburg Friday morning and they are asking drivers to be careful and courteous by passing safely along the road.
