as a veterinarian in 2008. Then on June 20, 2011, the new love in his life was his grandson Caleb Alexander Patton.

Keiford was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his wife Lucy, his daughter Karen Patton and her husband, John, of Sellersville, Penn. and grandson Caleb. He is also survived by his brothers, Laynard and wife, Cynthia, of Scottsdale, Ariz., Gary and wife, Rovella, of Norton and sister Bernita and husband Willis Daniels of Norton and other relatives and friends

Keiford was a great person who had a lot of love for God, country, and his family.

A celebration of Keiford's life will be held at 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, May 30 at the Paradise United Methodist Church in Paradise, Kansas with Pastor Daryl Sherraden and Pastor Sharon Thomas officiating. Burial and graveside services will follow at the Mt. Hermon Cemetery in rural Paradise. Visitation was Tuesday, May 29 at the Pohlman-Varner-Peeler Mortuary in Russell. 
