

In 1965, the Norton Dam was completed and Von's father, Don Fahrenbruch, moved his family here after taking a job as Reservoir Superintendent at the Norton Dam.

After graduating from Norton Community High School, Von also worked for the Bureau of Reclamation after his father retired, and along with Don started this sideline business in 1982 as a way to make extra money. F&F Iron & Metal Company began in the same location it is today, but in those early years there were no buildings, no office and no telephone. There was a tree on the property they would sit under to write checks to customers.

Small scales weighed the non-ferrous metals, aluminum, copper and brass, but they had no scales to weigh iron, so those loads were weighed at the elevator. This 'sideline business' has come a long way since those early days. Thirty years later it is a successful metal recycling facility with a host of machinery to handle the large quantities of metal brought in, and 12 full time employees.

"We think we do it right," Von said. "We use technology to stay current with laws and combat theft." Some of the new technology available includes security cameras, driver's license scanners, and a signature pad. For example, if law enforcement contacts them for possible information about recent theft of copper they can search their records for copper brought in by date or grade and provide all the details of the transaction.

Other technology they have incorporated includes a computerized machine that has a photo of the customer with their name and address so when recyclables are brought in everything for that customer is on file. And if their customer

Each month this column features one Norton chooses to receive cash for the scrap metal, they have an ATM that disperses that cash.

The types of metal they receive has also changed over the years. The 'old iron' is hardly seen anymore and they are getting more appliance tin and light gauge metals. This means they must change the way they process their metals. They have acquired a variety of machines to handle the steel scrap.

How and where do they dispose of all the metals? Light gauge metals, aluminum, copper and brass, are baled and sent out by semi-trailer. Heavy melt steel and cast iron are sent out by rail.

The facility recycles all the metals they receive. That means it is all reused and becomes new products. Steel is sold to both domestic and export markets and re-melted to make new steel products.

F&F Iron & Metals is truly a family operation. When the kids, Kiel and Kayla, were young Von would often take them along when delivering scrap by truck to other locations. Kiel is now the General Manager here. After 25 years in nursing at the Andbe Home, wife Kris sought a degree in Human Resources and joined the business in 2004 as the HR Manager.

Von says the major asset in his business are the employees. Chuck and Wes Eagleburger have been with him for 21 and 20 years respectively. In October 2004 F&F Iron and Metals bought a similar facility in Garden City. Former Nortonite Dakota Eberle is now that facility's Yard Manager. "All of our employees are dedicated to our way of doing business and work hard every day," says Von.

Von says the business has done very well for being in a small market with a rural population. Speaking about the future of the business, "We'll continue to change our process based on what materials are available," he explained.

About Norton, Von said, "It's home and it has a lot going for it compared to other communities. The work ethic in Norton is strong and we have many fine businesses. It's a good place to raise a family and I think it will continue to grow."

In August 2001, they bought Roger's Disposal as a way to diversify their business.


