fourth. After the two marksmanship scores, Norton was in sixth place overall and just 10 points out of second.

In the afternoon, the shooters took the written test and results were not released until the end of the shoot on Tuesday. As it turned out, Norton scored a 480 and tied for ninth in the written test with three other teams.

The ever-popular Barter Bar, where everyone exchanged souvenirs and promoted their state, was held Monday afternoon.

On Tuesday morning at 8 a.m., marksmanship began from the sitting position. The Blue Jays shot a 466 which tied for 12th in that position. Next, they completed shooting with firing from the kneeling position where they did much better, shooting a 459 in the second toughest position and tying for seventh, which also turned out to be their final placing overall.

Norton team members

The Norton team had just two experienced shooters, Erin Archer, 15 and James Berry, 13. Since Berry would not be able to return to the national shoot for another year, he will age out of the program.

Other members of the team, who will be eligible to return in two years if they qualify in state competition, were Stacie Elliott, 11; Dylan Goss, 11 and Colton Mulder, 10.

Competing as alternates for Norton were Nick Davis and Miles Harrington, both 11.

Assisting seventh year head coach Cameron Archer was assistant coach Jeff Elliott and classroom instructor for the third straight year was Chandra McKenna. Joni Berry was the scorekeeper for the national

Top Norton shooter

James Berry was the top Norton marksman with a 388 shooting score and 96 on the written test for a total score of 484.

James received a silver medal in the Awards Ceremony on Tuesday evening for his runnerup finish from the standing position with a 97 and a bronze medal for placing third out of all shooters with his 388 total

The top three teams received special recognition. The champion team received the traveling trophy. Members of the top three teams and the top three individual shooters, including James Berry, received individual medals.

Featured speaker for the evening was Steve Womack, former mayor of Rogers who is currently a U.S. Congressman.

Congressman Womack gave the young marksmen four basic principals of life that he recommended they follow: (1) get a good education; it will open doors for you (2 make good behavioral choices: know the difference in right and wrong and exert positive influence over your peers (3) good health is so important: eat right, get proper

rest and proper exercise (4) develop a spirit of charity; do something for others without expecting any rewards.

Began in October
