Logan hosting craft fair on Sept. 15

What little town hosts a great big fair? Logan: a farming community of 600. Nestled in northwest Kansas, on Highway 9, The Dane G. Hansen Museum sponsors one of the best craft fairs around on Saturday, Sept. 15. Hosting crafters from Kansas and surrounding states, this is a shopper's paradise. Family and friends rally together for this annual event held on the Hansen Plaza Square, Main Street, Logan. There is no admission charge to attend this event.

Crafters check in at pre-dawn in preparation for the 10 a.m. opening. Food vendors line two sides of the square. Food may include hamburgers, bratwursts, turkey and noodles, sloppy joe's, homemade pies, homemade ice cream, BBQ beef sandwiches, bierocks, sno-cones and more.

A chainsaw artist, Blair Smith, from Iowa, will be on the grounds with his chain saw artistry. He will be performing at 8 a.m., 10 a.m., noon and 2:30 p.m. and will complete several projects. Drawings will be held at 11:45 a.m. and 2:15 p.m. for two of his carvings.

Enjoy a trip through the streets of Logan with a surrey ride by John Allen, running 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Also learn some of the crafts around the plaza by watching demonstrations given by artisans throughout the day.

A jump slide, battle beam, and obstacle course will open at 11 a.m. and will be available to entertain the children through 4 p.m. Games and races will be held at 10 a.m. This will include turtle races, a sand pile treasure hunt and an egg toss. Bring your own turtle and kids.

Be sure to head to the Kid's Tent from 1-2 p.m. for face painting by the Logan KAYS and there will be free helium balloons as well.

Take a stroll through the Museum gallery and view "Eat Well, Play Well." This highly interactive exhibit encourages healthy living by teaching

the science of making healthy food choices and helping children and adults discover there are many fun and interesting ways to stay active

Check out our honored "Artist of the Month" items for sale inside the museum or just sit a spell and enjoy the comfort of air-conditioning.

Live entertainment on two stages will be performing at various times during the day. "Stanton Nelson," a young talented musician from Long Island, will be featuring his violin music on the south stage at 10 a.m., noon and 2:30 p.m. He will also be strolling the sidewalks and entertaining the crowd with his music during the afternoon. Multi-talented one-man-band Mark Nebel, from Hays, will be performing once again on the north stage at 11 a.m. and at 1:15 p.m. This will be a chance to hear his special musical talents.

Bob Jones, antiques appraiser from Jennings, will be available in the Community Room of Hansen Plaza for a free verbal approximation of value for your antiques from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. Registration forms to schedule a time for the appraisal are available through Hansen Museum.

Fertilize, but not too much

Fertilizing tomato plants is somewhat of a balancing act.

Tomatoes need fertilizer to yield well. At the same time, too much nitrogen will lead to lush plants with little to no fruit, said Ward Upham, K-State Research and Extension horticulturist.

Timing can be important, too, Upham added. You should fertilize during planting. After that, you should side-dress tomato plants three times with a nitrogen or nitrogen-rich fertilizer-- first, about one to two weeks before the first tomato ripens; second, two weeks after the first tomato ripens; and third, a month after the second side-dressing.

He said that if applied at the correct rate and watered in, any one of the following nitrogen supplies should give tomato plants the limited boost they need for top fruit production:

- * Nitrate of soda (16-0-0)

- Apply 2/3 pound (1.5 cups) fertilizer per 30 feet of row.

That rate is equal to about 2.5 tablespoons fertilizer per plant (which typically are spaced 3 feet apart).

* Blood meal (12-1.5-0.6) - Use 14 ounces (1.75 cups) per 30 feet of row or a scant 3 tablespoons (2.8 T.) per plant.

* Urea (46-0-0) - Apply 4 ounces (1/2 cup) per 30 feet of row or a scant tablespoon (0.8 T.) per plant

* Ammonium sulfate (21-0-0) - Distribute 0.5 pounds (1 cup) per 30 feet of row or 1

tablespoon plus 2 teaspoons per plant.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has prepared proposed Kansas Water Pollution Control Permit, A-URNT-H008, for Calvert Swine, LLC, located near Alma, Kansas. The proposed permit is for a waste control system for a confined feeding facility with a maximum capacity of 3,720 animal units of swine. The facility is located in the SW/4 of Section 19, Township 2 South, Range 21 West in Norton County, Kansas. A notice in the Kansas Register dated July 19, 2012 will inform the public of the availability of the proposed water pollution control permit for Calvert Swine, LLC. A public hearing has been scheduled in conformance with Kansas Administrative Regulation 28-16-61.

A public hearing on the proposed permit has been scheduled at 5:30 pm Central Daylight Time, Wednesday, August 22, 2012 at the Alma Community Building, 417 Main St., Alma, Kansas 67622.

Developmental Services of Northwest Kansas was recently announced as the recipient of a \$10,000 grant from the Dane G. Hansen Foundation. The grant award will be used for the purchasing of two portable handicap lifts.

Warnings issued for blue-green algae

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment samples recreational bodies of water for cyanobacteria, commonly called blue-green algae, when the agency is alerted to a potential algae bloom.

When harmful algae blooms are present, the department, in cooperation with the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks and Tourism and other lake managers where appropriate, responds by informing the public of these conditions. Based upon sampling results and established health risk levels, the following Warnings and Advisories are in place.

The department reminds visitors that when a lake is under an advisory or warning, marinas, lakeside businesses, and park camping facilities remain open for business, although swim beaches will be closed. Park drinking water and showers are safe and not affected by the algae bloom. Also, it is safe to eat fish caught during a harmful blue-green algae outbreak, as long as consumers clean and rinse the fish with clean, potable water; consume only the fillet portion; and discard all other parts. People should also wash their hands with clean, potable

water after handling fish taken from an affected lake.

As a result of this week's water sampling, the health warning has been lifted at Old Herrington City Lake.
