School district budget hearing is set for Monday, Aug. 13

In preparation for another year, Norton USD 211 will hold a public hearing on Aug. 13 to establish a budget for the 2012-2013 fiscal year. The hearing is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. at the Board of Education meeting room.

The proposed budget includes an increase in the

Local Option Budget from just under 16.2 mills to 16.4 mills, which is expected to generate just over \$655,000 for the district. The budget proposal does not change the current general fund mill levy of 20 mills.

The proposed overall budget for the school amounts to \$11,790,930 in total expenditures with taxes expected to generate \$1,492,318 for the district.

The overall tax rate is 39.4 mills.

Citizens of the Norton Community School district are encouraged to attend the Aug. 13 budget hearing to ask questions and express their opinions on the proposed budget. Detailed budget information is available at the district office and will be available at the public hearing.
