of anything that's a waste of money and declares carnival people are called gypsies because they gyp you out of hard-earned cash.



He used to like going to the horse races at the fair but since they switched to stock cars and motorcycle races, all he enjoys are the produce exhibits with jars of wheat and milo and boxes of garden sass.

Mama gave us money to buy supper at the Methodist ladies' hamburger stand but we get corndogs instead and Roger promises me cotton candy later, if I won't tell. There are wooden ducks to shoot, darts to toss at balloons, a baseball you pitch into a clown's mouth - he tries them all while I watch the bingo booth nearby. It has better prizes but costs





over my shoulder and she winks at me. We stand a long time at the age and weight booth to watch a barker flim flam the mayor and the police chief and other locals, then move on to watch the football team boys trying to ring a bell with a sledge hammer. It doesn't ring often.

Roger says he's too old to ride the merry-goround but he buys four tickets for me. I try a different horse every time. We both go on the ferris wheel, the Octopus, the Rat Catcher, the Tilt-A-Whirl and the Bullet. Our favorite has airplanes that rise and fall, circling, while they roll over and over and over. Each plane has a silver dollar spinning around in it but no one ever catches it.

There are barkers with horns out yelling about the "rassling" contest and the hoochie koochie dancers but Roger says Dad will scalp him if he takes me to either tent. We compromise on the Florida Swamp Alligator and Snake Show featuring man eating 'gators, jungle snakes and poisonous reptiles. The ticket man won't let me in. Rog says it's late anyhow so we sit and eat cotton candy before he drives me home.

He and his buddy, Jerry, are meeting at the stock car races later, so I give him a big sticky hug and a thank you. Privately I resolve to try not to be so aggravating tomorrow and, of course, I'll never tell that we ate gypsy food for supper!
