The 21st annual Jennings Firemen's Fun Day, always held on the fourth Saturday in August, will be held on Aug. 25. The theme for this year is "Kansas - Too Hot to Handle!" recognizing the importance of volunteer fire fighters in our communities and the scorching hot summer.

The day begins with a Health Fair and a Kolache Coffee from 8-10:00 a.m. in the Senior Center.

The health fair lab work covers a large number of tests at a minimal price. The health care team is also offering Vitamin D testing. The test costs \$25 and is important in this area as many people are Vitamin D deficient due to living in an area that has a long winter season without a lot of sunshine.

A new addition to the health fair is Amy Vacura, Essential Massage therapist, who will be doing massage demonstrations.

Other early activities include a bake sale and a craft fair in the American Legion building and the sale of homemade kolaches in the fire house.

Greg Otter of Lenora will be on hand with his train to entertain the children. Other events for kids include a dunk tank, coin search, pony rides and a giant slide.

The Wobble Trap Shoot, always a popular event, will begin at 10 a.m. at the Kenny Wildeman farm north of Jennings. Participants must provide their own shotguns and

ammunition.

A new educational opportunity is an Interactive replica of a three story house demonstrating common fire hazards in the home, courtesy of the Hoxie Fire Dept.

The Czech museum, one of the best museums in the area, will be open all day except during the parade. Admission is free and donations are welcome. The parade begins at 1:30 p.m. The Sons of the American Legion Post #63 and the Jennings American Legion Post #351 will lead the parade.

All entries, walkers, bikers, floats, vehicles, machinery, animals, etc. are welcome to participate. Entrants need to be at the south end of Pennsylvania Avenue (a.k.a. school street) between 12:30 and 1 p.m.

All females of any age are encouraged to enter the Queen contest. Registration will be at the parade entry site. Candidates will be introduced during the parade and the public can vote for the queen following the parade until 4:30 p.m. Taryn Fleckenstein, Jennings, is the reigning Queen.

Afternoon events include the Children's Tractor Pull, which is sanctioned for the State Fair and sponsored by Great Northwest Insurance Agency, Oberlin.

A drawing is held for a free girls' and boys' bike and helmet donated by the Jennings Fire Department and EMS. Children 12 years of age and younger can register to win and must be present to win. Other afternoon events include the Firemen's Team Barrel Competition, crowning of the queen, an auction of items donated by area businesses and individuals.

There will be a drawing for a TV, a surround sound system, and a portable DVD

player. Drawings will be held throughout the day for smoke alarms and fire extinguishers donated by the Jennings Fire Dept.

The lunch stand opens at the fire house at 11:30 a.m. and at 6 p.m., a hog roast supper will be served. Sno-cones and funnel cakes will also be available during the afternoon. A street dance with Mobile Music Express will conclude the evening.

The purpose of the Jennings Firemen's Fun Day is to make a day of fun and games for the kids of the area. It also serves to bring Jennings residents, former residents and friends together for a day of reminiscing. The money raised from the Fun Day event this year will be added to a fund to purchase new fire trucks for the Decatur county fire departments in Oberlin, Norcatour, and Jennings.
