Vintage victuals and shabby cookbooks

One of my favorite evening amusements is reading through old, shabby cookbooks. Space is at a premium when you're forced to downsize and while I did give up a lot of books, there were certain ones I had to keep. Among them were my oldest cookbooks. I've picked up a few more when I get into one of the many thrift shops here. The children all know my enthusiasm and keep an eye out for old volumes for me.

Recently, David and Shannon loaned me a fascinating old cookbook published by the St. James Guild of Belleville, Kansas in 1913. The tattered gray cover is reinforced with disintegrating tape, its well-thumbed pages are yellowed and dog eared but it is a joy to leaf and laugh at the household tips and the ads from merchants kind enough to sponsor church ladies who contributed their favorite 'receipts."

There are a number of other church cookbooks, both old and new, on my shelves, but this is by far the oldest. You'll find no mention of Jell-O, slow cookers, or microwaves but chafing dish recipes are plentiful. References to iron skillets, crocks and ice boxes are common, however, and ingredients such as rennet tablets, lard, and sorghum molasses are frequently found. Many thrifty cake recipes use honey rather than sugar, are eggless or use mashed potatoes or crumbs for a base.

Measurements were certainly different in years past. Cooks have always measured to some extent, but Fannie Farmer is credited with establishing standard measuring utensils back in the 1890s. Before she convinced manufacturers to produce cups and spoons using her precise measurements, it was common to find "butter the size of a walnut," "a pinch" of this or that, a wineglass of vinegar or a teacup

of sugar, "brine salty enough to float an egg" or "enough flour to make a soft dough." Many such phrases were still appearing in 1913. Often only ingredients are the entire text, no procedure given. For example:

BISCUITS THAT WILL NOT FAIL

Sift one quart of flour with two rounded up teaspoons baking powder. Work into this a piece of lard the size of a pullet egg. Add a pint of fresh buttermilk into which enough soda has been added to foam it, about a teaspoonful. And that's the entire recipe!

Belleville was quite the up and coming town with a veterinarian, two drug stores, one of which also carried paint and advertised proudly "Ice Cream Year 'Round. One ad cautions darkly about the danger of using baking powder with alum added to it. A mill in Beloit advertises "Gold Coin, Standard A" flour. The lumber company claims you cannot cook successfully without their coal. Two dealers advertise cooking ranges; one an old-fashioned cast iron Housekeeper's Friend while the other offers the latest thing, a Malleable Steel Range equipped with stovepipes lined with a composite of copper and aluminum, guaranteed never to rust. Haberdashers and clothiers were available to provide anything from overalls to corsets. All telephone numbers were two or three digits and I'm willing to bet you gave them to an operator after you cranked the handle on a wall mounted telephone.

A local banking institution boasts capital and surplus of \$45,000 so obviously there was plenty of cash available to purchase from all these merchants. Death was a thriving business, too, with two undertaking establishments, plus a monument company. The gentleman who operated the monument company was apparently a pessimist, or perhaps a comedian, since he suggests having your tombstone designed and on order in case any of the ladies' recipes prove

It was possible to get your harness oiled for only 50 cents, get a shave and a haircut in a six-chair barber shop, take free fancy work lessons at The Style

Store, borrow a book for two cents from the bookstore, or purchase fresh milk and cream from "tested" cows.

And now for dessert: **CAKE**

Two eggs

One heaping teacup sugar

One small cup milk

One teaspoon shortening Two small cups flour

Apparently you are just supposed to know what flavor and how to make a cake. Lots of luck if you're cooking 1913 style!
