City reports on 2012 pool season finances and use

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After the conclusion of the 2012 season, city leaders have released an operations report for the Norton swimming pool, indicating that the city lost just under \$20,000 from the facility this

According to the city's report, the total cost to operate the pool this season was \$45,430.15. The revenue from the facility was \$25,646.10, leaving a deficit of \$19,784.05.

According to city officials, such a deficit is not unusual for city pools. The loss in 2011 was \$19,115 and the loss in 2010 was \$19,557.

Included in the cost and revenue is concessions sold at the facility. The total cost of concessions for the pool was \$3,082.92 and total revenue from concessions was \$6,320.92

The city pool was in operation for 135 days this year and overall, the facility used 2,913,915 gallons of water for the season. The cost of the water usage based on current consumer rates is \$9,928.97.

For admissions, 69 individual season passes were sold, along with 64 family passes. Punch cards totaled 88 and the total single daily admissions was

Also this season, 13 pool parties were held at the facility. There were 11 lifeguards and five concessions workers employed.

Council approves streetlight purchase

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Looking for alternatives to inefficient lighting, the Norton City Council approved Wednesday evening a bid to purchase 175 streetlights for the downtown area.

According to Norton City Administrator Rob Lawson, the city received four bids for the purchase. The low bid was from Western Extralite of Hays in the amount of \$59,506.25.

Lawson said that the new lights will replace the current series lighting in the downtown area. The new lights are

brighter, much more energy efficient and are expected to last much longer than traditional incandescent lights.

The city has budgeted \$300,000 to replace street lights for the community and the installation of the current lights could take several months, depending on delivery time.

The lights that will be purchased are similar to the lights currently in front of the city office and post office. The new lights will include new fixtures on current light poles. The old fixtures will also generate some revenue for the city because they can be sold for scrap.

Extension announces new youth agent

kinesiology from K-State.

Drug take-back is Sept. 29

To help combat illegal and accidental presciption drug use, the Norton County Sheriff's Department is participating in the annual prescription drug disposal program.

On Saturday, Sept. 29, expired, unused and unwanted medication can be dropped off at the Sheriff's Office at the Norton County Courthouse. The service is free and anonymous and drugs can be dropped off from 10 a.m.-2

The drug take-back is not limited to only prescription drugs. Medications like cough syrup, over-the-counter pain relievers and pet medications will also be accepted. The medication will be collected and sent to the Drug Enforcement Agency for disposal.

According to information from the Sheriff's Office, the take-back program has garnered 276 tons of medication at 5,600 drop-off sites across the nation.
