Center promotes civic engagement

Michel Chikwanie, a 23-year-old motivational speaker and former child soldier from the Democratic Republic of Congo, will tell his story of endurance and unimaginable pain at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 12, in the Black and Gold Room at Fort Hays State University's Memorial Union.

Chikwanie, who was kidnapped by rebels and forced to kill at the age of five, leaves audiences with a new perspective on life, a sense of hope through social responsibility and a desire for change.

Chikwanie's presentation is one of several events sponsored by the university's Center for Civic Leadership (CCL) in September and October.

As a nationally recognized institute for citizen leadership development, the CCL provides high-quality educational programs and initiatives designed to enhance civic leadership capabilities among participants.

Other events on the schedule:

Sept. 11: Tigers In Service will place 297 flags around campus to represent the 2,977 men, women and children who died on Sept. 11, 2001. Tigers In Service encourages those on campus to remember the victims with a moment of silence near the flags at 9:59 and 10:28 a.m.

Sept. 17: From 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., the American Democracy Project (ADP) along with Forsyth Library will host the Ben Franklin Papers. It will be an educational day for fifth-graders to learn about Ben Franklin's inventions, contributions to our nation and the Constitution.

Also on Sept. 17, the ADP will honor the 225th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution. Volunteers will hand out T-shirts and sign students up to vote on TurboVote.

Sept. 19: In honor of Mexico's Independence Day, Global Leadership Project will host a Hispanic community service work day at Colonial Gardens in Hays. Volunteers will pick up trash and do yard work and other projects. Information regarding "Jana's Closet," a project through the Trinity Lutheran Church which provides gently used clothing for occasions such as job interviews, will be provided.

Sept. 22: Tigers In Service volunteers will help with a Family Fun Day hosted by Smoky Hills Public Television from 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., at the Ramada Inn in Hays.

Sept. 25: The ADP will sponsor FHSU's version of National Voter Registration Day, a nationwide event to inform citizens about their right to vote, and provide tools needed to register to vote. Place and time are yet to be decided.

Sept. 26: Dr. Chapman Rackaway, associate professor of political science, and his political science class on the presidency will give a Times Talk presentation titled "The Roles of the United States President" from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. in Forsyth Library.

Sept. 29: Partnering with the Hays Rotary Club, Tigers In Service will help paint houses. Teams and individuals are welcome as well as applications for houses to be painted. Time is to be decided.

Oct. 2: At 3:30 p.m., the Women's Leadership Project will hold an American Association of University Women meeting in the Memorial Union's Stouffer Lounge.

Oct. 3: Students and faculty will discuss health care in America at "Healthcare Policy," a Finding Common Ground discussion series event sponsored by ADP at 12:30 p.m., in Forsyth Library.

Minorities encouraged to join farm register

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency invites minority farmers and ranchers in Norton County and across the nation to voluntarily join the Minority Farm Register to receive information and opportunities from department agencies.

By joining the register, minority producers may receive outreach materials, newsletters, and program announcements from department agencies. They may also receive information and assistance from other outreach partners, such as community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, and minority-serving educational institutions. The department will carefully control access to and use of the register.

Individuals wishing to join the Register must sign and date a form that provides their name and address. Providing phone numbers, e-mail ad-

dress, race, ethnicity, gender and farm or ranch location will be voluntary, although the additional information increases the producer's opportunities for receiving timely assistance.

The Register pamphlet with the registration form is available at the Norton County Service Center or from approved outreach partners. Completed forms may be mailed to USDA Minority Farm Register, USDA Stop Code 0503, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20250. FSA and USDA's Office of Advocacy and Outreach are jointly administering the Register. Registration forms are available at www.fsa.usda.gov under "Forms."

An individual may remove his or her name from the Register by writing to the Minority Farm Register, USDA Stop Code 0503, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20250.

Accident Report

July 16-A Red 2010 Dodge Charger SXT, driven by Mark A. Pakkebieb of Densmore, was traveling east bound on Highway 9 when a deer came out of the south ditch and Pakkebieb was unable to avoid striking the deer, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Scott Bohl.

July 21-A black 2001 Dodge Dakota Pickup, driven by Carson K. Montgomery of Almena, was traveling west bound on Highway 383 when it drifted off onto the north shoulder of the roadway. Montgomery overcorrected and lost control. The vehicle came back onto the roadway where it crossed both lanes of traffic. The vehicle entered into the south ditch striking an embankment and coming to rest on its wheels at the edge of a corn field facing southwest. Montgomery was transported by ambulance to Norton County Hospital for unspecified injuries. The accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Bobby Annon.

July 23-A brown 1999 Mazda 626 LX, driven by David Vincent Jr. of Phillipsburg, was traveling west bound on Highway 9 when a deer ran out in front of the vehicle. Vincent was unable to avoid striking the deer, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Rich Wenzl.

July 23-A white 1989 Chevrolet Prizm, driven by Justin Royer Waggoner of Lenora, was traveling west bound on Highway 9 when a deer ran out in front of him. Waggoner was unable to avoid striking the deer, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Rich Wenzl.

Aug. 2-A white 2011 Ford F150 Pickup, driven by Phillip Edward Myer of Atchison, was

traveling east bound at mile-marker 91 on Highway 383 when a deer came onto the roadway from the south ditch. Myer was unable to avoid striking the deer, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Troy Thomson.

Aug. 8-A red 1996 Ford Ranger, driven by Dalton Gregory Vanover of Norton, was traveling south on W11 Road. Vanover was rolling up his window when he got into loose gravel and started fishtailing. Vanover over corrected and went into the east ditch striking a tree and causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. McDonald of Park, had its blade raised so as to not hit the road surface and it was crossing the road (south of Highway 36) and was driving into the ditch and didn't see another vehicle and hit it, causing over \$1,000 and damage to the vehicle. Aug. 16-A white 2005 Chevrolet Silverado Pickup, driven by Joseph Henry of Norton, was traveling east bound on Highway 36 when a deer came out of the south ditch onto the highway.

Henry was unable to avoid

striking the deer, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Larry Land.

Aug. 20-A black 1995 Ford F150 Pickup, driven by Gale Schulze of Norton, was traveling west bound on Highway 36 when a deer came out of the south ditch onto the highway. Morgan was unable to avoid a collision, causing over \$1,000 damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and the accident was investigated by Norton County Sheriff Officer Adam Wahlmeier.
