Minorities encouraged to join farm register

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency invites minority farmers and ranchers in Norton County and across the nation to voluntarily join the Minority Farm Register to receive information and opportunities from department agencies.

By joining the register, minority producers may receive outreach materials, newsletters, and program announcements from department agencies. They may also receive information and assistance from other outreach partners, such as communitybased organizations, faith-based organizations, and minority-serving educational institutions.

Individuals wishing to join the Register must sign and date a form that provides their name and address. Providing phone numbers, e-mail ad-
