To open the 2012-2013 season, the Norton County Arts Council hosted the Reza illusionist show Sunday afternoon at the East Campus auditorium.



Almena native breaks Leadman course record

cbell@nwkansas.com Capitalizing on a passion that began at a young age, a Northern Valley High School graduate recently broke the course record and won the Leadman race in Colorado.

A 1989 Northern Valley graduate, Tim Waggoner of Golden, Colo. ran the Leadman race on Aug. 18 in Leadville, Colo. The race consists of a marathon, a 50 mile mountain bike race, a 100 mile mountain bike race, a 10-kilometer run and 100 mile run. Prior to Waggoner competing this year, the previous course record was about 41 hours. He was able to complete the course in about 36 hours, though, setting a new record.

Waggoner said he started running in high school and excelled at track and cross country for Northern Valley High School.

"In Almena, there was (the) idea that you just went out for all the sports because your friends did," Waggoner said, "but once I did start (running) I enjoyed it completely. My coach, Bill Lowry, was also very supportive and I was influenced by him to continue with it and see what I could do."

In 1996, he began racing in Ironman triathalons and went on to become a professional Ironman competitor, which he did until 1997 when his oldest son was born.

"When my son was born, I went back

to just running, which takes much less time," he said. "I ran my first ultra race in 2008, a 50 mile trail run, and I won and broke the course record."

Waggoner explained that the Leadville race series is made up of the Marathon/ 50 mile mountain bike/ 50 mile run/ 100 mile mountain bike/ 10k run/ 100 mile run all within 2 months. The Leadman race is all of the races, except the 50 mile run, attempted in one continuous race.

"The 100 mile run is the first 100 mile run that I ever tried and I placed sixth overall out of 800 runners in 2010," Waggoner said. "Most people only choose one or two of the races in the series. Only about 100 people actually attempt the Leadman each year."

The Leadman race course consists mostly of jeep track, trail and dirt road running. The marathon portion was all jeep track and climbed up to over 13,000 feet of altitude. The 100 mile run is about 70 percent jeep track and trail and 30 percent dirt road. It has 12,000 feet of total vertical climb and is held entirely between 9,800 and 12,600 feet in altitude. It climbs over four mountain passes. The mountain bike portion of the race is similar terrain and climbing.

Though the Leadman is a competition against other athletes, Waggoner said he is primarily competing with himself.


"In a 100 mile trail race it's very

much against yourself," he said. "You get to a point where your body is completely broken and exhausted and you have to make it continue. You can also run for hours and not see another person so it's tough to actually 'compete' against someone else. I also believe

that winning comes more from simply giving 100 percent and that comes from within."

To train for such a challenging race, Waggoner said his strategy is primar-
