Varsity tennis takes runner-up in MCL tourney

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Jim Green's Norton Community High School varsity tennis team placed runnerup in the annual Mid-Continent League Tournament on Saturday, Sept. 29 in Phillipsburg.

The Lady Panthers were the champions with 41 points, followed by Norton, 24; Trego Community, 16; Osborne, 15.

Norton senior Tawni Griffey shutout all three opponents to remain undefeated for the season and win the gold medal in No.1 singles. She beat Jenna Dibble, Osborne, 8-0; defeated Arika Aiken, Phillipsburg, 8-0 and blanked Tabitha Wolf, Trego, 8-0.

"We had great weather for this round robin tournament," said coach Green.

"Tawni put on a stellar perfor-

mance, winning all three of her matches without losing a single point."

Playing for Norton's No.1 doubles team were juniors Rickele Green and Jessica White and they placed third. They drew a bye, then lost to Brooke Boyington and Kaitlyn Vogel, Phillipsburg, 8-5 and lost to Kimberly Day and Shaylee Flax, Trego, 8-4, to place third.

"Jessica and Rickele were playing doubles together for the first time," said coach Green.

"It took awhile for them to get accustomed to each other.

"As the day went along, they played better and better."

No.2 singles player for the Lady Jays was senior Sierra Black. She lost to Taylor Noel, Osborne, 8-3; lost to Amy Stapel, Phillipsburg, 8-6 and defeated Ella Sherwood, Trego,

8-2 to place third.

"Sierra played well all day," said coach Green. "She probably played her best tennis of the year."

Junior Ashley Hildebrand and freshman Audrie Burge played No.2 doubles for Norton and also finished in third place.

After drawing a bye, they lost to Kylah Ellis and Brittni Groothoff, Phillipsburg, 8-1 and lost to Cheyenne Phillips and Allyson Denning, Trego, 8-7.

"This was also Ashley and Audrie's first time to play together. Ashley played some of the best tennis of the year and together they gave Trego a run for their money, " said coach Green. "They came from behind to get ahead of Trego and were only one game away from a win. Trego tied up the set and sent the match into a tiebreaker. In the tiebreaker, our girls jumped out to a 3-0 lead but lost 7-4. They competed well for their first time playing together."

Next action

Norton competed today in the Class 3A Regional Tennis Tournament in Russell and first round results will determine whether Norton players will compete on Saturday.

Playing in the tournament in addition to Norton and Russell will be teams from Beloit, Claflin-Central Plains, Ellinwood, Ellsworth, Hoisington, Osborne, Phillipsburg and Victoria.

The top six singles and top six doubles finishers in the Regional Tournament will qualify for the State Tournament in Hutchinson at Trinity High School on Friday, Saturday, Oct. 12-13.



Junior high football team defeats Ellis

"This was a great effort by our football team. We did well in all facets of the game: offense, defense and special teams," said head coach Shane Miller.

The Blue Jays defense kept Goodland scoreless for most of the game, which is not an easy task against a pass proficient offense like the Mustangs.

"Goodland lines up in a spread type offense and passes the ball more than most junior high football teams," said Miller.

"The defense did a great job of making adjustments and coach Johnson moved kids around to create the right match-ups. Goodland also has one of the more athletic players that we have seen yet this year and we pretty well shut him down."

The leading tacklers for the Blue Jays were Jacob Green, six tackles and one inter-

ception, Layton Miller, four tackles, Kade Unterseher, four tackles and a fumble recovery and Collyn Auker, three tackles and an interception.

"We held their entire offense to 100 yards. You take away one big run they had of 70 yards and that tells you the 'toughness' of our defense tonight," said coach Miller.

"We also had interceptions by Jacob Green, Collyn Auker and a fumble recovery by Kade Unterseher."

Offensively, the Blue Jays running game was solid. In the first quarter, Jacob Green scored on a 3-yard run. Green ran in for the conversion as well, 8-0 Blue Jays.

In the second quarter, Trenton Wright scored on his only carry of the game from one yard out. Jace Ruder scored the 2-point conversion giving the Blue Jays a 16-0 halftime lead.

The score remained the same until the first play of the fourth quarter. Green would find the end zone from 15 yards out and the Blue Jays took a commanding 22-0 lead.

Goodland avoided the shutout with a late

fourth quarter score but it wouldn't affect the outcome of the game. Blue Jays win handily over the Mustangs, 22-6.

"Offensively we did some good thing as well, running the ball for 235 yards and passing for 36," said coach Miller.

Jacob Green was the Blue Jays leading rusher with 16 carries for 103 yards and two touchdowns. Tyus Henson had 43 yards on seven carries and Jace Ruder rushed seven times for 48 yards.

"I was proud of how we came out and controlled the ball game. We controlled the ball most of the third quarter and were able to wear down their defense. A score on the first play of the fourth quarter by Jacob Green put the game away," said the Blue Jays coach.

"This was a great win for us coming off last week's disappointing loss. I think last week's loss to Ellis was a 'wake-up call' and a valuable lesson. If we come out with the appropriate intensity, we can do some good things."
