We're barely into fall, but gardeners should begin working their soil now in order to improve the health of their soil for spring planting.

Fall is the best time to prepare garden soil, according to K-State Research and Extension horticulturalist Ward Upham. The soil is often too wet in the spring to work without forming clods that will be present the rest of the growing season.

"Even if you work wet soil in the fall and form clods, the freezing and thawing that takes place in the winter will break them down, leaving a mellow soil the following spring," Upham said.

He also recommended working leftover garden debris into the soil, which reduces the chances of insects surviving the winter and decreases the risk of diseases overwintering.

"Working the debris into the soil is easier if you

#### PUBLIC NOTICE PRAIRIE DOG CREEK WTAP SIGN-UP OPEN

The Kansas Department of Agriculture will be cepting applications for the Water Right Transiion Assistance Program (WTAP) from October 1 to ovember 15.

WTAP is a voluntary, incentive-based program deigned to help restore aquifers and streams in critical reas by retiring water rights. The Prairie Dog Creek Basin is significant in requirements to maintain compliance in the Republican River Compact with the State of Nebraska. The "high priority" areas o this basin in Phillips, Norton, Decatur, Sheridan and Thomas counties have been determined to be in need of stream restoration and aquifer recovery and are now closed to further water appropriations.

Applicants who are selected for WTAP grants are ompensated by the department's Division of Conservation in exchange for the permanent retirement o vater rights on irrigated land
