

# Huskies football cuts Natoma short on the road

The Northern Valley Huskies bounced back from their first loss of the season by pummeling the Natoma Tigers 54-8 in Natoma on Friday, Oct. 5. Offensively, the Huskies went to the ground and pound, compiling 355 yards rushing on 50 carries and a 7.1 yards per rush average. It was late in the first quarter before the Huskies got on the board. Junior running back Jordan Baird scored on a six yard run. Baird scored the conversion as well, 8-0 Huskies. With 1:41 remaining in the quarter, junior quarterback Hunter Chandler found the end zone from 20 yards out. Sophomore running back Phillip Bryant rushed for the 2-point conversion and the

Huskies led 16-0. Just over a minute into the second quarter Baird scored again, 14 yards in all. Chandler passed to senior end Jon Compton for the 2-point conversion and the Huskies were up 24-0. The Tigers capitalized on a defensive mistake by the Huskies when Natoma's Harley Hazlett hit Jackson Meiers on a 45 yard touchdown pass to end the shutout and cut the Huskies lead to 24-8. But with 5:21 remaining in the first half, the Huskies scored three unanswered touchdowns. First it was Chandler, scoring on a 28 yard run, 30-8 Huskies. Less than three minutes later Chandler broke through the Tigers defense scoring on a 51 yard run. Bryant scored the 2-point conversion, 38-8 Huskies.

"We were able to break some longer runs once we were able to adjust to the run blitzes that they were using," said Huskies head coach Chuck Fessenden. Down 30 points, the Tigers went to the air for a quick score before the half but Baird intercepted the Tigers pass and went 28 yards the other way for the score, giving the Huskies a commanding 46-8 halftime lead. "We were able to get some pressure on their quarterback. Our defensive backs played pretty solid pass defense. We gave up one big play on a short slant when we missed the tackle," said Fessenden. Less than two minutes into the third quarter, Baird closed the game out with a 27 yard rush-

ing touchdown. Bryant ran in for the conversion giving the Huskies a 46 point lead and ending the game via the 45-point rule. The Huskies' leading rushers were Chandler with 12 rushes for 130 yards and three touchdowns, Baird with 16 rushes for 110 yards, three touchdowns and one 2-point conversion, and Bryant with 18 carries for 93 yards and four 2-point conversions. Bryant led the Huskies defense with six solo tackles and two assists and sophomore Matt Stutsmann had four solo tackles and three assists. "We must now get ourselves ready to play a good Stockton team," said coach Fessenden. Northern Valley will be back in action tonight when they host Stockton at 7 p.m. in Alma.

# Junior Huskies team defeats Cheylin in six-man in Bird City

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The Northern Valley Junior High football team won its second game in a row, beating Cheylin handily 64-14, in a six man game at Bird City on Thursday, Sept. 27. The Huskies had plenty of room to run against the Cougars with 277 rushing yards, 60 passing yards, seven offensive touchdowns, two special teams touchdowns and four fumble recoveries. In the first quarter, seventh grade running back Caden Kinderknecht scored on a 1 yard run, the first of four rushing touchdowns on the day. Carson Wallace added the 2-point conversion, 8-0 Huskies. Then it was seventh grade receiver Briely Yocum snagging an 18 yard touchdown pass from eighth grade quarterback Drake Shearer. Kinderknecht scored the conversion, 16-0 Huskies. Eighth grader Carson Wallace had a big game with 102 yards rushing on only four carries and two touchdowns. The first Wallace touchdown came on a 46 yard blast through the Cougar defense. Wallace scored the 2-point conversion as well on a pass reception from

Kinderknecht, 24-0 Huskies. Still in the first, seventh grader Keegan Smith went to the house on a 20 yard punt return, making it a 30-0 blowout. The scoring barrage slowed down in the second quarter. Kinderknecht scored the only points on a two yard run and the Huskies took a 36-0 lead over the Cougars at halftime. Cheylin came out of the break with a quick strike, scoring on a 56 yard touchdown run from sixth grader Jordan Janicke, Cougars trailed 36-8. However, the Huskies and Wallace had an answer. Wallace broke free for a 41 yard touchdown run. Kinderknecht added the conversion and the Husky lead was back to 36 points, 44-8. The Cougars continued to fight back in the third quarter. Seventh grader Jorge Gonzalez scored from 16 yards out, 44-14 Cougars trailed. But the Huskies closed the game out in the same dominating fashion they opened it with: three unanswered touchdowns. Late in the third quarter, Kinderknecht cut through the Cougars defense for 33 yards and the score. Shearer's pass to Yocum scored the 2-point con-

version, 52-14 Huskies. The defense got in on the scoring when eighth grader Damian Wellman recovered a Cougar's fumble in the end zone, extending the Huskies lead, 58-14. The Huskies ended the game with Kinderknecht scoring his fourth touchdown on an impressive 35 yard run and sealing a 50 point Huskies win over the Cheylin Cougars, 64-14. The Huskies running attack was spear headed by Wallace and Kinderknecht. Wallace rushed four times for 102 yards, two touchdowns and one 2-point conversion.

Kinderknecht rushed 15 times for 119 yards, four touchdowns and two 2-point conversions. The passing game was limited to only five passes but the Huskies were efficient when they did pass. Shearer had two completions on three attempts for 26 yards, one touchdown and a 2-point conversion. Kinderknecht was two for two passing for 34 yards and a 2-point conversion. Briely Yocum's two receptions were good for 26 yards, one touchdown and a 2-point conversion. Damian Wellman had one reception for 31 yards

and Wallace had one reception for three yards and a 2-point conversion. The Huskies defense was very opportunistic, recovering four fumbles in the game by four different players: Carson Wallace, eighth grader John Towery, seventh grader Dalton McDowell and Damian Wellman. Leading tacklers were Keegan Smith, nine tackles and six assists; Caden Kinderknecht, eight tackles and five assists; seventh grader Cooper Muss-

man, seven tackles and three assists; John Towery, six tackles and three assists. Huskies head coach Jim Cole had plenty of positives to reflect on after the game. "All 12 of the Husky players got to see plenty of playing time in this game. We played a very good all around game," said Cole. "I was very pleased with our tackling. We are getting more aggressive with each game."

## Northern Valley team runners medal at Alma

Alma Invitational

Three of four Northern Valley runners medaled at the Alma Invitational in Alma, Neb. on Monday, Sept. 10. In women's varsity, Brooke Baird placed 6th with a 4,000 meter time of 19:59. In the men's 5,000 meter, Jon Compton placed 4th (21:04), Macy Kasson took 9th (22:21) and Camden Cox placed 17th (25:23). "Alma is a small school meet, so all of our athletes ran as varsity runners. Everyone ran well. Macy and Camden improved their times. Jon and Brooke ran up front which helped them to place well, but they each may have extended themselves a little too much early in the race. Experience and conditioning will help with that," said Huskies cross country coach Kirk Kasson. "Allison Keith missed this race due to a conflicting schedule with junior varsity volleyball and Cody Land missed the race due to an injury," said Kasson.

In junior varsity action, the Huskies took first place in both the men's and women's races. Brooke Baird had a winning kick down the final stretch to post a personal best 18:28 in the women's 4K. In the men's junior varsity Macy Kasson improved his season best time to 21:17 to win the gold medal. Camden Cox placed 23rd in 25:21. "I was very happy with all four runners. Each one showed me something I had not seen from them this year. Jon and Brooke are starting to understand how to run in a more relaxed manner. Macy ran a strategic race and put pressure on the leaders throughout. When the opportunity came he was able to take over the pace. Camden was struggling with illness, and
