Blue Jays defeat Minneapolis on the road, 41-20

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Lucas Melvin's Norton Community High School football team traveled to Minneapolis on Friday for their first district contest and saw a 19-7 halftime lead vanish on the first play of the fourth quarter before rallying with three touchdowns to win 41-20. It was the first of three district games which will decide who moves on into the state playoffs. The top two teams in the District will ad-

"We played hard; our guys were hitting," said coach Melvin. "It was a slippery field so we passed more in the first half. Defensively, we missed too many tackles that kept them in the game. It was a good thing that every time we needed to answer their scores, we did."

Norton had 145 rushing and 188 passing for 333 total yards and Minneapolis gained 109 yards rushing and 191 passing for 300 total.

First quarter

Norton received the opening kickoff and was three-andout. After senior Jacob Brooks punted, the Norton defense held Minneapolis to three-and-out. The Lions punted to the Norton 21. Senior fullback Jared Bohl gained 5 yards, junior tailback Tanner Furbush ran for a first down on the Norton 33 and senior quarterback Dalton Miller earned another first down on the Norton 45.

Miller went to the air and hit tailback Brooks with a perfect pass and he sprinted 55 yards to the end zone. The extra point kick try by junior Austin Hager was unsuccessful and the Blue Jays led 6-0.

After Hager's kickoff, Minneapolis fumbled and junior end Cole Renner recovered for the

Blue Jays on the 30. Norton was ter a running play with the Blue unable to score and the Lions took over. The Norton defense held and Minneapolis went into punt formation. The snap from the center was mishandled by the punter and senior tackle Lucas Engel fell on the ball on the Minneapolis 25. Again, Norton was unable to score and the Lions took over on their 22.

On third down, the Norton defense forced quarterback Matthew Comfort out of the pocket and he ran for a first down on the Lion 32.

Second quarter

Minneapolis earned two first downs before Brooks intercepted a Comfort pass on the Norton 15. After three first downs, Norton punted to the Lion 25. They also got three first downs before Garrett Lott got loose on a 26 yard touchdown run. Yoxall kicked the extra point and the home team led 7-6.

It took just 17 seconds for Norton to answer and regain the lead. Brooks returned the kickoff to the 30 and, on first down, he caught another pass from Miller, broke a tackle and was off to the races for another Blue Jay score. Hager split the uprights, making it 13-7.

The aggressive Blue Jays struck again less than a minute later. Hager's kickoff was fumbled and junior defensive back Trever Lewis alertly fell on the pigskin on the Minneapolis 17. On second down, Miller passed to Furbush. He broke a tackle and ran into the end zone. The extra point kick was wide but Norton led 19-7 with 34 sec-

Comfort returned Hager's kickoff to the Minneapolis 42 where Hager made the tackle. After Comfort made a first down on the Norton 45, he was sacked by Engel and the half ended afJays on top 19-7.

Third quarter

Norton threatened to score again early in the quarter when the Lions were stopped by the kickoff team on their 17. After one first down passing, Brooks intercepted a Comfort pass on the Norton 44. Miller got one first down and Brooks gained two more first downs before the Lion defense stiffened. A Hager field goal try was blocked.

The Lions had the ball on the 50 after a Norton penalty and Comfort connected with Luke Eckert on a touchdown pass. The extra point kick missed but Norton was whistled for roughing the kicker. The second try was good and Norton led 19-

After the kickoff, Norton drove to the Minneapolis 35 before running out of downs. The rain began to fall again at this point but the Lions were still able to move the ball to the Norton 12. Blue Jay senior tackle Lane Bigge fell on a Lion fumble on the 9 but, on first down, Norton fumbled and Minneapolis recovered on the Norton 7.

Fourth quarter

On the first play of the final period, Comfort passed to Josh Macy for a touchdown. The extra point attempt was no good but the home team was ahead 20-19.

It took Norton just two minutes to regain the lead for good. Furbush got a good kickoff return to the Lion 25. From there, Brooks, Furbush and Miller made good gains and Brooks ran the final 8 yards for his third touchdown of the evening. Miller passed to senior wide receiver John Risewick for two extra points and it was 27-20.

The Minneapolis receiver fumbled Hager's kickoff and he recovered the ball on their 10. Brooks intercepted a Comfort third down pass and sprinted 16 yards for his fourth touchdown of the night. Hager's kick made

After Hager's kickoff, the Norton defense held the Lions on four downs and took over on their 32. Miller dented the end zone from 8 yards out after gaining 19 yards on three carries. Hager's kick extended the Norton lead to 41-20.

The Lions had the ball for three plays after Hager's kickoff before officials cleared the field and stands due to threatening lightning and, after a short delay, the game was called with the Blue Jays winning 41-20.
