# Norton Cross Country wins at regionals

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com On Saturday in Cimarron, the Norton Community High School girls and boys cross country teams won first and runner-up, respectively, in the Class 3A Regional Cross Country Meet for the third year in a row to qualify for this Saturday's State Meet at Rim Rock Farm, northwest of Lawrence.

Until three years ago, the Norton girls and boys cross country teams had not qualified in the same year for the state meet but, in Cimarron in 2009, the Norton girls placed third in the regional and the boys finished runner-up. Two years ago, the girls won the championship and the boys were runner-up when the regional meet was held in Larned. The meet was also held in Cimarron a year ago.

The top three girls and boys teams qualified for the state meet along with the fastest 10 individual runners. Also qualifying for state are the top five individuals from non-qualifying teams if not in the top 10.

The Norton girls won the championship with 29 points, followed by Cimarron, 70; Thomas More Prep-Marian of Hays, 75; Holcomb, 82; Scott City, 85.

In the boys race, Holcomb repeated as champion with 60 points, followed by Norton, 64; Scott City, 75; Cheney, 108; Lakin, 134; Southwestern Heights, 144; Chaparral, 173; Phillipsburg, 189; Thomas More Prep-Hays, 203; Cimarron, 204.

#### **GIRLS**

Norton sophomore Sierra Griffith led the Lady Jays to the finish line with a third place individually and clocking of 18:45. She was followed by junior

Darcy Bainter, fifth in 19:04; "The weather was quite warm for the end of October but our junior Katelyn Engelbert, sixth, girls came out as hot as the 19:10; freshman Molly Maddy, weather. Having five runners eighth, 19:19 and senior Julia Kent, tenth, 19:26. All five were medal is just fantastic!

"All of our girls did a great job. Kamilla Jones became ill during the race but was able to hang on and finish. The course was changed this year and must have been quite a bit longer than last year because just about every runner had about two minutes longer time than last year.

"All week long we talked

about our goals and our girls accomplished them all.

"Now, we focus on the big race at Rim Rock this week. The 3A girls race is wide open with several teams that can contend for the championship. Our girls must focus and run with the tenacity that they have shown many times this year."

Norton junior Marc Miller was first to the finish line for the Blue Jay boys with a fourth place individual finish and time of 19:55. He was followed by freshman Brendon Frack, seventh, 20:17; junior Alec Hager, ninth, 20:34; sophomore Dalton Vanover, 13th, 20:45; junior Keith Sander, 35th, 22:24.

Also running for Norton were senior John Renner, 46th, 22:47 and senior Ryan Bainter, 66th,

"Words cannot tell how proud we are of our boys' effort today," said coach Rossi. "For the fourth year in a row, both teams have qualified for the state

"Every one of these young men did exactly what we set out to do and came very close to a regional championship, almost beating Holcomb, the No.1 ranked team in the state!

"Marc Miller, Brendon Frack and Alec Hager were all able to medal and Dalton Vanover came from the very end of the pack and nearly medaled himself. The run of the day had to come from Keith Sander. We preached all week that the number five runner had to be in the top 35 in order for our team to qualify for state. At the two mile mark, Keith was in 44th place and at the end he moved up to

"Our guys proved that they can run with the best teams in the state. We just have to run with the same intensity at state and, if we do, who knows what these guys can do."

## Blue Jays suffer big upset against Beloit on Friday

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Beloit used a quick score offense, beginning with the first play of the game, to hand the Norton Community High School football team only its second loss of the season on Friday night at Travis Field.

After scoring on the opening kickoff, Beloit dominated and the Trojan offense was so effective that they did not punt in the game, which they won 56-9.

It was the second District win for Beloit, who defeated Phillipsburg in District play the week before. Norton defeated Minneapolis a week ago in their first District contest.

Phillipsburg beat Minneapolis on Friday night in the other District game, setting up a final District game between Norton and Phillipsburg this Thursday evening in Phillipsburg. Norton will have to defeat the Panthers to move on in the Playoffs.

Coach Lucas Melvin's 6-1 Blue Jays were stunned on the opening kickoff when Beloit returned the kick 87 yards for a touchdown. After a two-point run, the Trojans led 8-0.

Beloit scored twice more in the first quarter while Norton's only score came on a 31 yard field goal by Austin Hager to give the visitors an early 20-3

Two more touchdowns in the second quarter extended the Be-

loit lead to 34-3 at halftime. Norton's only fumble came at the start of the second half and led to another Beloit touchdown and was followed by the Blue Jays' only pass interception for another score, making the tally 50-3 after three quarters.

The visitors drove for another touchdown in the fourth quarter before a 64 yard pass from senior quarterback Dalton Miller to senior tailback Jacob Brooks produced Norton's only touchdown.

"They haven't punted all season and, like other teams, we couldn't stop them but we had opportunities to score and couldn't," said coach Melvin. "We were inside their 20 yard line three times and didn't score. We made mistakes and you can't make mistakes against

a team like Beloit. Penalties and turnovers hurt us.

After an incomplete pass, Jacob Brooks punted to the Beloit 30. An unnecessary roughness penalty against Norton moved the ball to the Beloit 44. After five running plays, the Trojans went to the air and quarterback Payton Vetter completed a long pass to 6'6" Austin Budke, who was tackled on the Norton two-yard line. Vetter scored, the run for two-points failed and Beloit led 14-0 with 8:48 left.

Hager returned the kickoff to the Norton 24 but, after three plays, Brooks went back into punt formation. It was a fake and Brooks passed to senior wide receiver John Risewick who was finally stopped on the Beloit 6-yard line! The Blue Jays were unable to score a touchdown but came away with a 31 yard field goal by Austin Hager to cut the Beloit lead to 14-3 with 5:25 left.

The Trojans returned Hager's kickoff to mid-field. On second down, Stanten Krone ran for another Beloit touchdown. A pass for two extra points failed, making it 20-3 with 5:09 left.

Brooks returned the kickoff to the Norton 36. First down runs by Brooks and quarterback Miller and a fourth down pass completion to Risewick put Norton on the Beloit 39. Miller ran the keeper for 8 more yards and junior tailback Tanner Furbush got a first down on the 25. A flat pass from Miller to Brooks earned another first down on the 15. Three plays gained no more yards for Norton.

### Second quarter

A fourth down pass fell incomplete.The Trojans then put together their longest drive of

the game which ended with a Niemczyk 3 yard run. Vetter ran for two-points and it was 28-3 with 8:37 left.

The kickoff went out of bounds on the Norton 28. Fur-Norton's Austin Hager kicked bush had a great 36 yard run to one first down, Vetter connected with Budke on a long pass and Krone scored from 2 yards out. A pass for two points failed but Beloit led 34-3 with 4:16 left.

Hager returned the kickoff to the 21. After one first down, Miller passed to Risewick and he carried the ball to the Norton 40. Miller ran the keeper to the Beloit 40. Pass interference and horse collar penalties against Beloit moved the ball closer to the goalline but Norton was unable to score.

### Third quarter

Beloit kicked off and the ball went out of bounds so Norton got it on their 35. The Blue Jays' only fumble of the game was recovered by Beloit and they scored again on a 14 yard pass from Vetter to Budke. Vetter ran for two extra points, extending the Beloit lead to 42-3 with only 45 seconds gone in the second

Furbush returned the kickoff to the Norton 36. Miller gained a first down on the 50, then passed over the middle to Brooks for a first down on the Beloit 17.

Miller was sacked three times by the aggressive Beloit defense and, on fourth down, Budke intercepted his aerial and rambled 72 yards untouched for another Beloit touchdown. Vetter passed to Niemczyk for two extra points, making the score 50-3 with 6:29 left.

The huge lead by Beloit put the continuous clock into ef-

After the kickoff, Norton was unable to move the ball and punted to the Norton 45 as the quarter ended.

## Fourth quarter

Beloit drove down the field for one final touchdown. Krone scored from 22 yards out. The extra points run failed and the Trojans led 56-3 with 9:57 remaining.

After the kickoff, Norton got

their only touchdown of the game when Miller hit Brooks with a perfect pass for a 64 yard touchdown. The extra point kick was blocked, leaving the score at 56-9 with 2:13 left.


