To be a county commissioner it takes certification, 48 hours of certification over two years as well as on the job training. Charles Posson, who will be taking the place of John Miller and who has been attending meetings since the first part of the year, stated, "I think it is very important for a county commissioner to be certified." Carolyn

Applegate, who will be stepping down in January and being replaced by R.A. Peterson as commissioner, has several years experience and added to what Posson said by stating, "By going to the training sessions, it helps to build a network of contacts, which is invaluable."

Our county commissioners are always on the job, at home, at work, at the grocery store and, as expected, at the commissioners meetings every Monday morning. The certified training required consists of ten hours in the Introduction to the Commissioners job, five hours of Financial Management, five hours of County Budgeting Basics, five hours of County

Government and the Law and five hours of Leadership for a Productive County Workforce. They are also required to receive five hours of Building an Effective County Team, five hours of Effective Management of Intergovernmental Relations, five hours of Ethical Citizen Commissioners and three hours of Ethical Consideration for County Commissioners.

As you can see, it is so much more then people realize. There are training, meetings, trips, time from family and work. Our county commissioners give so much and ask little in return in hopes of making where we live a better place.

Insurance representative reports on county employee policies

Charles Krull, a representative from Blue Cross and Blue Shield, addressed the Norton County Commissioners last week.

He stated that Norton County currently had 64 employees covered by his company, 40 single policies, two for the employee and their children, 12 for the employee and their spouse and ten policies that covered the whole family. Along with this information, Krull reported that there would not be a refund to the county this year due to a 78.48 loss.

With the Healthcare Reform, a summary of benefit coverages must be either emailed or mailed to the county employees no later then December 1 of this year. All benefit summaries should be uniform, and all look alike. Krull stated that there

were no cuts or benefits reduced. He also stated that there will be no co-pay; it all will go toward the deductible and then 100% of the bills will be paid.

As for the Health Reimbursement Account, the county can not pay less then 5 percent of what they are paying now and for Preventative Services coverage, 100 percent will be paid.

There will be a .4 percent decrease in total premium for next year so to maintain Grandfather status prices of the policies will change, with a single policy going down \$6.48, a policy for the employee and their spouse goes down \$13.98, for an employee and their children it goes up \$18.83 and for a family policy it will also increase \$11.32.

Employees should expect their summary of benefits by December 1.
