Be a quitter on Thursday

Society marks the 37th Great American Smokeout on Nov. 15 by encouraging smokers to use the date to make a plan to quit. The Society provides tips and tools online at cancer.org to help smokers quit tobacco for good. An estimated one billion people worldwide will die during the 21st century because of tobacco use, according to The Tobacco Atlas, published by the American Cancer Society and World Lung Foundation.

"Tobacco use remains the single largest preventable cause of disease and premature death in the United States," said Jennifer Taylor, Society community manager in Kansas. "Quitting smoking is the most important thing you can do for your health and the Great American Smokeout is a great way to start."

Research shows that smokers are twice as likely to quit smoking for good when they get help. One way to get help is by calling the Kansas Tobacco Quitline smoking cessation hotline that is available at no charge 24 hours a day, seven days a week at (800) QUIT-NOW. When you call, a Quit Coach will work one-on-one with you to create a plan to quit smoking and help you learn to fight your cravings. Free coaching is also available online at KSquit.org.

Other valuable resources that will help you quit smoking are nicotine replacement products, counseling, a smoking cessation support group, prescription medicine to lessen the cravings, guide books, and encouragement from friends and family.

Tobacco use accounts for at least 30 percent of all cancer deaths and 80 percent of lung cancer deaths. In the U.S., tobacco use is responsible for nearly one in five deaths, or about 443,000 premature deaths each year. Smokers who quit, regardless of age, live longer than people who continue to smoke. In just 20 minutes after quitting smoking, heart rate and blood pressure drop, and in about one to nine months after quitting, coughing and shortness of breath decrease.

The American Cancer Society created the trademarked concept for and held its first Great American Smokeout in 1976 as a way to inspire and encourage smokers to quit for a day. Since then, it is estimated that more than two million U.S. smokers quit for the day each year for the Great American Smokeout. And if they quit for the day, perhaps they will quit for good.
