
# 'Tis the season

#### Improve efficiency in the kitchen and cut costs at your local K-State Research

It is estimated that about 20 percent of the energy used in the United States is used for food production, transport, processing, packaging, distribution, storage, sales and household food handling.

While much is out of an individual's control, most people could be able to reduce household utility costs in the kitchen.

Here are some tips for costsaving changes that are fairly easy to incorporate into everyday living:

1) If hand-washing dishes, allow them to soak first; after washing, rinse in batches, and turn off the water between batches. Use hot water for wash-

ing, cool water for rinsing. 2) If using a dishwasher, wait until a dishwasher is full before running it; choose the shortest cycle to accomplish the job, and allow the dishes to air dry.

ASVAB test for all juniors in 3) Defrost food in the refrigerator, rather than under running JH basketball vs. Western

4) Check refrigerator and freezer seals, which should be School-Thanksgiving airtight. Clean the seals regularly, and replace as needed.

5) Open the refrigerator or School-Thanksgiving freezer door as needed, but close it as soon as possible to retain internal temperature.

> 6) Turn off an ice-maker when additional ice is not needed.

7) Follow the manufacturer's directions for cleaning coils and the interior and exterior of the appliance.

8) Use all appliances as directed by the manufacturer. Take the

time to read the manual when the appliance is purchased, and review it periodically. For example, a refrigerator or freezer should be about 2/3 full (but not crowded) so air can circulate and cool the foods stored within. Overcrowding generally reduces efficiency.

9) Minimize pre-heating time when using an appliance, and use a microwave oven instead of heating a stove, when pos-10) If replacing an appliance,

#### PUBLIC NOTICE PRAIRIE DOG CREEK WTAP SIGN-UP OPEN

cepting applications for the Water Right Transition Assistance Program (WTAP) from October 1 to WTAP is a voluntary, incentive-based program de-

ed to help restore aquifers and streams in critic areas by retiring water rights. The Prairie Dog Creek Basin is significant in requirements to maintain compliance in the Republican River Compact with the State of Nebraska. The "high priority" areas of this basin in Phillips, Norton, Decatur, Sheridan and Thomas counties have been determined to be in need of stream restoration and aquifer recovery and are now closed to further water appropriations. Applicants who are selected for WTAP grants are

compensated by the department's Division of Conser vation in exchange for the permanent retirement of water rights on irrigated land For more information, contact Steve Frost, wate
