Commissioners updated on county staff and equipment

c.haynes@nwkansas.com The Norton County Road and Bridge department is short two employees but there is some concerns with hiring before the first of the year.

Sandy Smith, the road and bridge department administrator, told the commissioners that since one employee has taken medical leave, she is now down two people and a lot of her employees have leave time coming before the end of the year.

Commissioner John Miller noted that it would be good if the department could wait until the beginning of the year because the road and bridge budget is mostly gone for this year. Commissioner Carolyn Ap-

plegate disagreed.

"I think we should hire somebody who's willing to work," she said adding that by the time a person was interviewed and hired, they would probably only be on the payroll for a couple of weeks at the end of December.

While the weather is good, there might not be a problem, she said but if there is a big snowstorm or a problem with downed trees, the department will need everyone they can get.

The commissioners finally decided to leave the decision up to the department.

Mrs. Smith also said that the road and bridge department is putting up new 911 (street type)

signs on the major roads in the county – U.S. 36, 283 and 383 and Kansas Highway 9 and 60 and the road to Prairie Dog State Park.

The signs will have the new required breakaway posts, she said. So far, the posts alone have cost \$2,500. She said that she thought they might have enough sign blanks to make up the signs.

She also told the commissioners that the seven-mile project on E12 Road to put down shale to build up the roadbed by six inches is almost done. After putting down the shale, she said, the department is putting down sand to keep the dust down.

While most people along the roads are happy with the project, she said, she has had a couple of complaints by people who thought that they should work on shorter segments and another party, who didn't think the materials were of high enough quality.

The project should be done by the first of the year, she said, sooner if the weather holds.

She said that other than that, the department doesn't have many other projects pending but she is hoping to start looking at a new or newer truck for the department. One of the trucks, she said, gets 100 to 150 miles per day and has 118,000 miles now.

The commissioners said to look but don't even think about getting anything before the first

of the year.

In other business, the commissioners:

· Had the two commissioners-elect, Dr. R.A Peterson and Charles Posson, in attendance at the meeting. They will take the place of commissioners Carolyn Applegate and John Miller in January.

• Heard a report on Kansas Health Information Network and the Norton County Hospital board meeting by Commissioner Miller.

• Discussed some replacement parts for doors at the landfill.

• Discussed attending the hospital Christmas party.

· Learned that Penco Engineering has mailed a letter for the county to the federal Bureau of Reclamation for repairs on top of the dam at Norton Reservoir.

• Met briefly with Economic Development Director Scott Sproul about the projects his office is working on.

• Decided to give the county employees New Year's Eve off. The county already gives its employees Christmas, Christmas Eve and New Year's Day off.

• Passed a resolution to make New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day (observed), Christmas Eve and Christmas Day official county holidays plus one/half day for Good Friday in 2013.
