You do not have to be a member of the booster club to attend.


Cookie and candy walk on Wednesday

County transportation bus broken down

The bus, which has been in and out of the shop several times since early summer, finally blew its engine on Wednesday afternoon while the director was looking for a replacement vehicle.

Ramona Pabian, retiring director of the Norton County Senior Citizen Center, introduced her replacement, Melinda Segura, who will take over in two weeks, to the commissioners and told them about the bus problems.

"I'm here to plead, beg, borrow," she

After the engine blew up, she said. "There were bits of metal lying all over the ground."

The bus, a 2004 Ford, wasn't cooling properly, she said, so they took it to Lewis Auto in Hays, the Kansas Department of Transportation certified service agent for the vehicle, on June 14. The bus wasn't returned until Aug. 17 and it still had problems

When the bus was out of the county, she said, she used her personal vehicle to transport people. She said that she has since found out that she will not get reimbursed for this..

had a new compressor on the air conditioner but was still not working as it should, she said. Lewis only charged for labor, she added.

On Nov. 26, the bus was taken into Co-op for service and to check the fluids. The service agent said that there was a leak in the lines and felt it was unsafe to drive.

Sheriff warns to be weary of recent scams

The Norton County Sheriff's Department warns everyone to be leary of scams.

After receiving a threatening letter via e-mail, the Telegram was prompted to contact the Norton County Sheriff's Department. It was unknown at the time if this was a scam or the real deal.

Norton County Sheriff Troy Thomson reported that there have been several scams going on in Norton and they seem to be increasing in number over time and they vary in context.

The e-mail which lead to this story was a threat to the recipient stating that a hit had been put out on them but the hit man wanted to help and if the recipient paid a large sum of money they would be safe. This is extortion, people! They threatened a person's life along with their family and demanded large sums of money if they did not do as instructed to. This is a very scary feeling, is it for real or not, what about my children, family and friends.

There are some very bad people out there in this world that pray on the fears of others.

A second known scam that has affected Norton is done by telephone. Usually, an elder person is called and the person on the other end of
