Blue Jays compete at Topside Tip-Off

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School boys basketball team lost to Oakley 61-49 in their opening game of the Topside Tip-Off Tournament in Goodland on Thursday.

In the consolation bracket on Friday, they lost a close 42-38 contest to Wray, Colo. which put them in Saturday's seventh place game, which they won by a solid 54-38 score over Burlington, Colo.

Ottawa defeated McCook 62-54 for the championship on Saturday. Third place went to Oakley with a 52-44 win over Goodland. Sharon Springs won the consolation championship by an 81-37 score over Wray.

In the tournament opener 61-49 loss to Oakley on Thursday, the Norton boys outscored the Plainsmen from the field but allowed Oakley to win the game at the free throw line.

The Blue Jays outscored the Plainsmen 42-40 on field goals but sent Oakley players to the free throw line 35 times and they made 21 of them while Norton hit just 7 of 13 charities.

The game was closer than the final score. Oakley led 15-13 after one quarter and 34-21 at halftime. The Blue Jays outscored the Plainsmen 13-9 in the third period to narrow the Oakley lead to 43-34 but Norton was outscored 18-15 in the final quarter.

"I was disappointed with our defense," said coach Reusink. "We made mental mistakes; just little stuff that hurt us.

"When we got behind, we got in too big of a hurry to catch up and tried to force things. We have to learn to be patient and play smarter."

Senior Dalton Miller hit three baskets, senior Jacob Brooks hit a three-point and two-point bucket and senior Lane Bigge swished a basket for Norton's 13 first quarter points.

The Blue Jays' 8 second quarter points came on baskets by sophomore Conor Cox, Miller, senior Carson McKenna and

In Norton's 13-point third period, McKenna, senior Andrew Ellis and junior Drew Schrum each drained three-point baskets. Brooks hit a basket and free throw and Cox swished a charity.

Brooks finished strong, hitting four baskets and four free throws in the final period. Senior John Renner hit a basket and Schrum swished a free throw.

Leading scorer for Norton was Brooks on 1 of 5 from the three-point line for 20 percent, 6 of 18 two-point attempts for 33 percent and 7 of 23 overall for 30 percent accuracy. He also was a perfect 5 of 5 from the charity stripe and finished with 20 points.

As a team, Norton hit 4 of 13 from beyond the arc for 31 percent, 15 of 39 two-point attempts for 39 percent and 19 of 52 overall for 37 percent.

Norton had a very close game with Wray on the consolation side on Friday before losing 42-

With Jacob Brooks hitting all Norton's points, the Blue Jays took a 13-5 lead after one quarter. Wray had their best quarter in the second, outscoring Norton 17-11 to cut the Blue Jays' halftime lead to 24-22. Brooks scored all of Norton's points once again except for a basket by Andrew Ellis.

Norton went cold in the third quarter, hitting only two baskets. Carson McKenna scored early in the period and Norton did not score again until Tanner Furbush hit a basket at the buzzer. Wray tallied 10 points in the quarter to edge ahead 32-28.

Brooks stole the ball and scored early in the fourth quarter to tie the score at 30-all and minutes later McKenna scored to tie it at 32-all. Wray jumped out to a five-point lead but Ellis buried a three point basket to cut the Wray lead to two.
