## City council hears from Mayor and issues permits

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At the Norton City Council meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 2, Mayor David Corns reported the city sales tax receipts collected in December 2012 totaled \$20,261.79, and the county sales tax receipts totaled \$14,766.52, for a total of \$35,028.31. The 2012 year to date sales tax receipts totaled \$475,015.33. This is an increase from 2011 total sales tax receipts.

Also, Mayor Corns stated that anyone wanting to file for the seats which will be up for council election the deadline is Tuesday, Jan. 22 at noon. The general election will be held on April 2.

The Council also approved the reappointment of Karen Griffiths to the Northwest Kansas Community Corrections governing board for a two-year term.

The Council approved the State of

Kansas contract bid of \$25,753 to purchase a 2013 Ford Utility Police Interceptor vehicle. A budget of \$30,000 was set for the purchase which will replace one of the high mileage police

Chief of Police Pat Morel distributed his year-end statistics sheet and said it was a quiet New Year's Eve and that 11 people used the "Safe Ride Home" program.

City Attorney Karen Griffiths reported the setbacks, street size, distance from street and side streets of the new addition have been approved by the Code Inspector and City Administrator and meet the city requirements. Griffiths also said the City Council has to approve the plat, which approves the streets for city purposes, the name of the streets and the name of the addition; if approved, it is filed with the Register of Deeds and then all work in the new addition has to comply with the plat. ### Foul play ruled out in local death

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According to Norton City Chief of Police, Pat Morel, at 10:45 a.m. Friday morning the Norton City Police were called out to do a welfare check on an individual. Upon arrival at the home, officers found the deceased body of Jeremy (J.J.) Courtain. The Kansas Bureau of Investigation was called in to rule out the possibility of foul play. Several people were interviewed and all released in the case. There was an autopsy done in Hays which did rule out foul play however the investigation is ongoing until the toxicology report has come back. Mr. Courtain leaves behind two children, his mother, a brother, other family members and several friends. Services will take place at Enfield Funeral Home on Monday Jan. 21 at 10:30 a.m. with a dinner to follow in Almena.
