A new year, and new exhibits at the Norton Public Library

A New Year, and new exhibits at the Norton Public Library. Do plan to take time to see four very different but very interesting displays.

Again, Jim and Marla Ruth, Almena, are sharing a part of another of their collections. This time it is kerosene lamps.

A bit of history reveals that open flame lamps with fixed central wicks date from the 1690's. About 1850, Samuel M. Kier made lamps that burned kerosene he distilled from surface oil. When oil was struck in Pennsylvania in 1859 the first economical source of kerosene

By 1860, a solid round wick was used. The gadget that turned the wick up and the glass chimney were added later.

Central wick lamps were made in numerous forms - wine glass lamps, peg lamps, chamber lamps and lamps with a vase shaped body.

In the display you will find a banquet lamp with a red swirl shade and a pink body. This is called a Pairpoint lamp. The dark green lamp, with painted flowers, was made by the Riverside Glass Company. The all brass lamp, a boudoir lamp, was made in France. The cranberry glass, on the top shelf, was made by the Hobbs Glass Company.

There are aladdin lamps, with tall narrow chimneys. The aladdin kerosene lamp, patented in 1909, gave a strong white light, virtually smokeless and odor-



Kerosene lamps were made of pressed glass, pottery and many had metal pedestals.

Deb Terrell shares the interesting display of beautiful edgings and crocheted thread lace. Deb shared these comments about her display.

"My grandmother, Velma Kendall, passed away in 2003; she was 91 years old. Her crochet basket was given to me. When I opened the basket, it was full of neatly rolled colorful edgings and crocheted thread lace. I remember watching her work on her projects, making the colorful lace to put on pillowcases, towels, and other items that she would give family members for birthdays, Christmas, weddings and other special occasions. She would embroider something pretty on the pillowcases, then add just the right amount of edging to make it a treasured gift for someone. Tatting was not her favorite, but many people have never seen a tatting shuttle or what tatting looks like. The handkerchief box is homemade. She lived on a farm; did chores and still made time to do fancy work for gifts. In her memory, I wanted to share her art work."

In the second flat exhibit case is Judy Fawcett's display of depression glass. Here is Judy's

"I actually started to collect depression dishes about 40 years ago when I found a box of my grandmother's things in my folks garage waiting to be taken to the Thrift Shop. In one of the boxes was a pink cake plate, which I was told, came out of a box of detergent. I asked mom if I could keep it and, of course, it was fine with her. I liked the depression glass so well that my daughter gave me another piece for Christmas that year. Not knowing how many designs and colors there are in depression glass, we found the piece that I received for Christmas did not match my grandmother's piece. After that I purchased a book on depression glass and have fallen in love with many pieces."

The next stop is the Art Gallery where you will find the art work of Maia Carlson. While home from Kansas State University, between semesters, she put up her display.

Maia has been drawing from an early age. Mostly, she enjoys drawing (and painting animals) but is always learning and branching out. An interest in anatomy is the basis of her drawing style, and at K-State University she is taking a lot of biology classes to better understand the animals that she draws and their anatomy. At K-State



she is taking no art classes because she enjoys it as a hobby.

Maia also writes and illustrates books (which are in the Norton Public Library, or available from Dr. Maurer, her mother). Her brother, Leif, helps Maia design the book covers.

These exhibits will be on dis-

play from January through the end of March. Do plan time to visit the Norton Public Library to see these displays. While there, check out a book or two for your reading pleasure or knowledge. The library has a lot to offer.
