Several topics dealt with at city council

The Norton City Council met on Wednesday, Jan. 16, and approved a cereal malt beverage license request for Brenda and John Sanders, the new owners of Town & Country Kitchen at 419 E. Holme. The license allows for alcoholic consumption on the premises

The Norton Public Library received Council approval to purchase and install security cameras inside and outside the building, at the Library's expense with

the City helping with labor if needed.

The Council also held a hearing for Jon Keiswetter, to discuss his Notice and Order of Violation issued for 408 South Street. City Attorney Karen Griffiths explained to the Council the procedure to be followed. Code Inspector Jeff Wolf presented pictures showing the violations cited in the Notice and Order dated Dec. 11, 2012. The list was reviewed to see which violations had been addressed and eliminated. Keiswetter also presented pictures showing violations on other

properties that haven't been cited and pictures of his brother's property clean up. Keiswetter said he bought the property six months ago and is in the process of cleaning it up. The Council then approved a motion to have Griffiths draft a resolution addressing the violations that remain on the property, giving Keiswetter 60 calendar days after the February 6 City Council meeting to remove the items, with the City abating any items that remain after the 60 days and charging Keiswetter for the abatement. If Keiswetter sorts

the items and puts them at the curb and then notifies the City that the piles can be picked up, the City will pick up the items at the curb with Keiswetter being charged the landfill fees.

City Administrator Rob Lawson reported that new lights have been installed at Elmwood Park and that more lights will be added in the future. Lawson said the City's snow removal policy for sidewalks had been advertised and some violators had been notified. Also, the trash dumpsters have

Candidates have filed for the general election

file for school and city elections to take place April 2, 2013.

Three candidates filed for the position of Norton City Mayor, incumbent David Corns along with Len Coady and Craig Knapp. Two filed for the Ward one city council position, incumbent Jerry Jones and Jon Keiswetter. Roberta Ryan re-filed for the Ward two position and will run unopposed, and in Ward three two have filed, Robert Bowman and Jeffrey Urban.

There are three city council positions open in Almena. The only people to file for these positions are the incumbents, Kevin Sides, Tracy Stutsman and John Griffiths, all running unopposed.

In the City of Lenora, current Mayor Raymond Heikes re-filed and will be running unopposed. There were two city council positions up for election and incumbents Edwin Lloyd Schoen and Daniel Mannel were the only ones to file and will be running unopposed.

There are four seats open in the City

of Edmond. Current Mayor Todd Nuttycomb re-filed and will run unopposed. The same goes for the city council. Incumbents, Robert Wiltfong, Tammy Kachel and Miriam Sanson all re-filed

As for the City of Clayton, there were no filings for any of the six seats open at this time.

and will run unopposed.

As for the Norton School Board elections, there are four positions open. Bill Jones re-filed for the Position 1 District 2 seat and is running unopposed. There were no filings for the Position 4 District 2 seat that was held by Scott Ellis. The two other positions up for election are the Position 5 District 1 seat and Position 6 District 2 seat and incumbents Craig Renner and Robert Wyatt were the only ones to file.

At the Northern Valley Schools, USD 212, there were three school board positions up for election. Incumbents, Linda Malcolm and Curtis Lowry who currently hold the District 1 fourth and fifth position seats both re-filed and are running unopposed. No one has
