Blue Jays defeat Atwood on their court

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Coach Doug Reusink's Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team has been hurt this season by one poor quarter in games but it didn't make any difference on Saturday when they defeated Atwood 78-54 in Atwood.

After taking a 21-12 first quarter advantage, Norton was outscored 16-7 in the second period to tie the score at 28-all at intermission.

Norton fans needn't have been concerned. The Blue Jays came out in the third quarter and poured in 30 points to lead 58-44! A 20-point fourth quarter put the explanation point on the victory!

"We fought through some poor shooting in the second quarter to stay even at half," said coach Reusink. "We came out in the third quarter with a great effort on the offensive end to get a much needed win.

"We have been fighting hard to get a win and that persistence finally paid off."

Norton hit 54 percent from the field and 71 percent from the free throw line in the win.

Six different players scored in the first quarter for Norton. Tanner Furbush hit three baskets, Andrew Ellis hit a shot from bevond the arc and a two-pointer, Drew Schrum also buried a three point shot, Lane Bigge hit two baskets, Jacob Brooks swished two free throws and Carson McKenna hit one charity.

The Blue Jay shooters went cold in the second quarter when they scored just 7 points. McKenna hit a shot from long range and Dalton Miller hit two baskets.

The third quarter was the complete opposite with 30 more Norton points going on the scoreboard! Miller led the way with four baskets and a free throw, followed by Brooks, three baskets and a charity; Ellis, two baskets from long range; Schrum, a basket and three charities; McKenna, another basket and John Renner, one free throw.

Brooks continued to hit in the fourth quarter when he swished five more field goals and a free throw. Conor Cox added two baskets, Ellis hit another trey and Schrum hit another twopoint basket.

Norton had four players in double scoring figures. Brooks led with 20 points. He missed his only three-point try but hit 8 of 11 two-point attempts for 73 percent and was 4 of 5 from the charity stripe for 80 percent accuracy.

Ellis ended with 14 points. He hit 4 of 8 from beyond the arc for 50 percent shooting and also hit a two-point basket.

Miller put 13 points on the board. He was 6 of 10 on twopoint attempts for 60 percent and hit one free throw.

Schrum scored 10 points. He

had a perfect shooting night from the field. He hit his only shot from long range and was a perfect 2 of 2 on two-point shots. He was also 3 of 4 from the free throw line for 75 percent.

Peterson led Atwood with 25 points; Tiemeyer added 15.

As a team, Norton hit 6 of 12 from beyond the arc for 50 percent, 25 of 45 two-point attempts for 56 percent and 31 of 57 overall for 54 percent!

Atwood found the range on 2 of 11 treys for 18 percent, 16 of 34 two-point tries for 47 percent and 18 of 45 overall for 40 percent.

Norton hit 10 of 14 free throws for 71 percent and Atwood hit 16 of 22 charities for 73 percent.

Norton outrebounded Atwood 29-18. The Blue Javs grabbed 12 offensive and 17 defensive caroms and the Buffaloes pulled down 7 offensive and 11 defensive boards.

Brooks led Norton in rebounds with 9, followed by Furbush, 5; Ellis, 4; McKenna, 3; Cox, 2; Renner, 2; Miller, 2; Schrum, 1; Bigge, 1.

Norton had 10 steals compared to 6 for Atwood. Thefts leader for Norton was Ellis with 4, followed by Schrum, 2; Miller, 2; Brooks, 1; McKenna, 1.

The Blue Jays displayed good teamwork with 18 offensive assists; Atwood had 15.

Assists leaders for Norton with 4 each were Br pooks, Schrum, Ellis and McKenna. Furbush and Bigge each had 1 assist.

Brooks blocked 2 shots. Both teams had 13 turnovers.

Junior varsity The Norton junior varsity boys team also shot the ball well and played good defense in defeating Atwood 72-5.

Norton held quarter leads of 22-0, 48-2 and 65-5.

A 13-8 third quarter extended Norton's lead to 33-24. Ruder proved that her basket from beyond the arc was no fluke when she buried three more shots from long range in the third period. Engelbert added another basket and Griffey hit another pair of charities.

Engelbert was leading rebounder for Norton with 7, followed by Jones, 3; Griffey, Bohl, Ambrosier 2 each; Ruder, 1.

Griffey had 6 of Norton's 8 offensive assists. Ruder and Jones each had 1 assist.

Norton had a big advantage in the steals department. The Lady Jays had 10 thefts compared to
