the Norton City Building . Rick Ensz, with Cooper, Malone, McClain, Inc., was in attendance to review the revenue bond documents for the swimming pool project. Ensz stated the bonds were secured at a rate ranging from 0.75 percent to 4 percent, with an average rate of 3.49 percent which The Class 3-2-1A State Wrestling is lower than the estimated 4.11 percent used in the proposal. The Council then approved a motion, by a 4-2 vote (Jerry Jones and Ron Briery voted no), to adopt Resolution #7-2013, authorizing the City of Norton to enter into a base lease with the Public Building Commission whereby the City will lease to the PBC certain

PBC whereby the City will lease from

the PCB certain property, including the swimming pool facility located thereon; approving the form of said leases; and authorizing the execution thereof and certain related documents. This resolution authorizes the City's signature on all related documents, including the base lease with the City and the PBC, the lease between the City and the PBC, the Bond Purchase Agreement between the City and Cooper, Malone, McClain, Inc., and the PBC, and the closing certificate for the City.

The City Council then voted to recess its meeting in order to hold a Public Building Commission meeting.

The commission adopted, by a 4-2 vote (Jerry Jones and Ron Briery voted no), Resolution No. PBC 3, which authorizes the issuance of City of Norton, PBC revenue bonds, series 2013, in the aggregate principal amount of \$4,535,000 for the purpose of paying the costs of constructing and equipping a swimming pool facility in the City of issuance of said bonds; and authorizing certain other actions in connection with the issuance of said bonds. The Resolution authorizes the signing of all associated documents required for the bond issue.

The Commission also passed, by a 4-2 vote (Jerry Jones and Ron Briery voted no), Resolution No. PBC 4, providing for the adoption of a tax-exempt financing compliance procedure relating to obligations issued and to be issued by the City of Norton, Public Building Commission.

Mayor David Corns then reconvened the City Council meeting and called for a five minute recess so the necessary documents could be signed.

The Council also approved spending of some of the Hansen Foundation grant money. The Council wants \$25,000 to be used for the downtown project at State and Main, and at State cost of \$9,967.50 and the purchase will and Washington where the trees have been removed, and \$10,000 will be

Weed department reports to county

It's time to buy chemicals to spray and Norton County Noxious Week Supervisor Reggie Beckman went over what he sprayed last year and what he needs to do this year with the county commissioners on Monday.

Last year, the county spent just a little under \$50,000 on chemicals to fight weeds in the fields and along the roadways

Mr. Beckman handed out a report of what the county had sprayed in 2012 including types of crops and chemicals used.

Last year, the county sprayed 31,000 acres infested with field bindweed, 26,260 acres of musk thistle, 5,010 acres of Johnsongrass, 2,290 acres of

Canada thistle and 65 acres of bur ragweed.

That included 7,700 acres of corn, 1,800 soybean, 5,100 grain sorghum, 5,100 CRP ground, 31,200, range pasture, 430 other crops, 8,345 fallow ground and 1,150 non agricultural land.

Chemicals used include 370 gallons of 2,4-D amine at a cost of \$14.50 a gallon, 108 of 2,4-D LV ester at \$23,20 a gallon, 220 of aminopyralid (Milestone) at \$307.25 a gallon, 12.5 of dicamba (Banvel and Overdrive) at \$37.50 a gallon; 48 of glyphosate (Roundup) at \$12.25 a gallon; 160 of picloram (Grazon, Tordon and Outpost), 5 of triclopyr (Remedy) at \$49.95 a gallon; and 1,346

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
