Leadership series set for March

Registration is now open for K-State Research and Extension's series of Board Leadership workshops to be held across the state in March. Designed to provide basic training for members of community-based boards, the series will be hosted by local Extension professionals at locations across the state. A session will be hosted for the Northwest area in Norton County at Norton Junior High School.

"Informed and committed board members are the key to healthy, effective boards and committees in our Kansas communities. K-State Research and Extension's Board Leadership Series will provide an opportunity for board members to learn the basics of being a good board member," said Trudy Rice, Extension Community Development Specialist. "Whether you are a member of a church board, a township board, a United Way agency board, or a rural water board, this training is appropriate for you."

The series will kick-off on March 4 with Conducting Effective Meetings. During this session, participants will learn about their roles and responsibilities as a board member, basics of parliamentary procedure, and strategies to make meetings more productive and effective.

On March 11, the topic will be Understanding Fellow Board Members and Conflict Management. Participants will explore how personalities and generational differences affect the decisionmaking process, and learn how to manage conflict in a way that is productive, not destructive, to the board.

The March 16, session will cover Fundraising, Fund Management, Legalities and Ethics. This session will explore a board's options for raising and managing money, understanding such things as articles of incorporation, by-laws, and policies

Strategic Planning will be the final topic on March 25. Participants will learn about establishing a common mission and vision for the board, and how to plan priorities for the future.

All sessions will be conducted from 6 to 8 p.m. Workshop participants will meet at host sites throughout the state to take part in web-based instruction and locally facilitated discussion. Sites include: Beloit, El Dorado, Garden City, Hutchinson, Iola, Lakin, Leavenworth, Liberal, Manhattan, Norton, Topeka and Sabetha.

Students participating will engage in both large- and smallgroup environments around topics such as diversity, inclusion, leadership styles, service learning, personal strengths and adaptive leadership. Opportunities are available to influence other people and to serve a greater good. These opportunities could result in creating change and having the courage for the change.
