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Lady Jays win in Sub-State

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The No.3 seed Norton Community High School girls basketball team led No. 6 seed Minneapolis until late in the fourth quarter of their first round Class 3A Sub-State Tournament game in the NCHS Stull Gvm on Wednesday, then had to fight off a furious rally by the Lady Lions for a 43-41 win!

In fact, Minneapolis took their only lead of the contest with 1:38 remaining on a field goal and free throw. With the visitors ahead 41-40, Norton was unable to score and the Lady Lions got the ball back. They were working the ball around and hoping to hold onto the slim advantage until Norton fouled when suddenly Norton's Tawni Griffey stole the ball and dribbled the length of the court for a driving layup! She was fouled in the act of shooting and calmly hit nothing but net on the free throw for the three-point play and a 43-41 Norton lead with 24.7 seconds left!

Minneapolis tried frantically to set up a scoring play but a Lady Lion charged into Bailey Ambrosier, fouling her and turning the ball over. Time ran out on the Minneapolis rally and Norton survived to move into the semi-finals of the tournament.

The Lady Jays played No.2 seed Ellsworth on Thursday evening. Ellsworth edged No. 7 seed Beloit 52-48 on Wednesday. Results of the Norton-Ellsworth contest were not available at the Norton Telegram's press time.

The winner of that game will play on Saturday at 7:30 p.m. in the Stull Gym with a trip to the State Tournament as a reward to the winner.

Leading the entire game until the late Minneapolis rally, Norton was on top 19-14 after one quarter, 27-20 at halftime and 36-26 after three quarters.

"In the first half, we came out very aggressive," said Norton head coach George Rossi.

We did a great job of attacking their full court press and getting the ball into the post.

"In the fourth quarter, Minneapolis became more aggressive and we didn't do a very good job of responding. We weren't as assertive as we needed to be late in the game.

"We had two really good plays at the end that made the difference; Tawni got the interception and Bailey took the charge.

"I want to thank our home crowd for the tremendous support. They were awesome and that was huge!'

Norton got off to a great start in the game, scoring 19 first quarter points and five different girls lighting up the scoreboard. Ambrosier hit two baskets and a free throw, Johnnye Ruder

swished a shot from beyond the arc and two-point basket, Kamilla Jones hit two baskets, Katelyn Engelbert drained a shot and Griffey threw in a shot from beyond the arc.

Norton scored just 8 points in the second period but still led by seven points at intermission. Scoring baskets for Norton in the second stanza were Griffey, Engelbert, Katie Bohl and Jones.

Norton outscored Minneapolis 9-6 in the defensive third quarter. Engelbert hit two more baskets, Bohl hit another and Ambrosier hit a basket and free throw.

In the crucial fourth quarter, Ruder buried a three-point shot and Engelbert hit a free throw in addition to Griffey's crucial steal and three-point play.

Norton had the most even scoring distribution of the entire season with six players scoring but none in double figures. Engelbert led the way by hitting 4 of 8 shots for 50 percent and 1 of 4 free throws for 9 points.

Griffey, Ambrosier and Ruder each ended with 8 points. Griffey hit 1 of 10 from long range, 2 of 5 two-point shots and 4 of 15 overall and also hit 1 of 2 free throws.

Ambrosier swished 3 of 6 two-point shots for 50 percent and hit 2 of 5 free throws.

Ruder hit 2 of 2 from long range and 1 of 1 two-point shots for a perfect night from the field.

Leading scorer for Minneapolis was Kynedi Allison with 14 points; Jacee Owens added 13.

As a team, Norton swished 3 of 12 from beyond the arc for 25 percent, 15 of 28 two-point attempts for a sizzling 54 percent and 18 of 40 overall for 45 percent.

Minneapolis hit 2 of 10 from long range for 20 percent, 15 of 45 two-point tries for 33 percent and 17 of 55 overall for 31 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton hit just 4 of 11 for 36 percent compared to the Lady Lions' perfect 5 of 5 for 100 percent.

Norton outrebounded Minneapolis. The Lady Jays pulled down 8 offensive and 24 defensive caroms for 32 total. The Lady Lions grabbed 9 offensive and 18 defensive boards for 27 total.

Engelebert was leading rebounder with 10, followed by Ambrosier, 8; Griffey, 6; Bohl, 3; Ruder, 2; Jones, 2; Alec Melvin, 1.

Norton had 6 steals compared to 9 for Minneapolis. Engelbert led with 3, followed by Jones, 2; Griffey, 1.

The Lady Jays had 11 offensive assists. Griffey was the leader with 5, followed by Ambrosier, 2; Jones, 2; Engelbert, 1; Melvin, 1.

Norton hit a season-low 31 percent from the field and 19 percent from the free throw line while Hoisington left the nets smoking on 65 percent field goals and 71 percent from the charity stripe.

"We needed to be more patient

in the first quarter, a basket by Jacob Brooks, as the Cardinals forged a 21-2 lead.

Norton scored 10 points in the second quarter on two field goals by Conor Cox and baskets by Brooks, Lane Bigge and Tanner Furbush. Hoisington continued to hit the basket and added 19 more points to their total to lead 40-12 at halftime.

Norton's best quarter was the third where the Blue Jays had 14 more points, 10 of them coming from Brooks. John Renner hit a three-point basket and Furbush added a free throw. Hoisington had their best quarter, however, throwing in 25 points from everywhere on the court.

In the first quarter, sophomore Matt Stutsman got the Huskies off to a good start scoring seven of his team's 13 first quarter points. Junior Ian Vincent scored four points on two field goals and senior Phillip Compton had two points on a bucket. The Tigers kept pace, scoring nine points in the quarter including a 3-point basket from sophomore Triton Frye.

In the second quarter, the Tigers would close the gap thanks to the hot hand of junior Jackson Meiers who scored eight of his team's 14 points in the quarter on four field goals. The Huskies managed 11 points in the quarter, six points coming from junior Hunter Chandler who scored three baskets. Stutsman hit on a 3-pointer and sophomore Brant Cox scored two on a bucket, and the Huskies took a slim one point lead into halftime, 24-23.

In the third quarter the game would get even tighter, Meiers scored another eight points for the Tigers including two 3-pointers and senior Phillip Murphy added five points. The Huskies responded with five points from Stutsman who scored a 3-pointer and a bucket and five points from junior Jordan Baird who hit a 3-pointer and two free throws. The Huskies and Tigers closed out the quarter tied at 38.

Both teams were red hot in the fourth quarter but free throws were the difference and the Huskies made them count. Murphy scored 12 of the Tigers 20 points off of three 3-pointers, a basket and a free throw and Frye had five points on a bucket and three free throws, but they couldn't match the Huskies 28 points. Stutsman scored 11 points in the final stanza including a 3-pointer and converting six of six from the free throw line. Brant Cox was clutch from the charity stripe as well hitting on six of eight free throws and Chandler had six points as well, scoring two baskets and two free throws. Baird added five points on a trey and two free throws as


the Huskies ran away with a 66-58 victory over the Tigers.
