Area teams win State Basketball titles

Also competing were the Sharon Springs boys, Stockton boys, Russell girls, Beloit boys, Golden Plains-Rexford girls, Hoxie boys, Ness City boys and Belleville boys, who won the Class 2A boys title.

The Smith Center girls extended their final season record to 24-2 when they defeated Jefferson County North 63-55 in Class 2A play on Saturday in Bramlage Coliseum in Manhattan to win their first ever state championship! The Lady Red never relin-

quished the lead after taking control of the game in the first "Our girls worked really re-

ally hard to get through a tough sub-state in Plainville and didn't rest on that performance," said Smith Center head coach Nick

Smith Center beat Sedan 61-35 in the first round and outscored Sterling 62-59 in the semi-finals.

The Hoxie girls brought a perfect record into the Class 1A, Division I State Tournament in Emporia and left with an unblemished 26-0 mark after defeating Olpe, who also came into the game unbeaten, by a 68-63 score.

It was the second straight state championship for the Hoxie girls, who outscored South Haven 81-36 in the first round and beat St. John 47-41 in the semi-finals.

The Scott City boys became the only team in history to win three consecutive Class 3A state championships when they defeated top-seeded Humboldt 74-55 to win the state title in Hutchinson

The Beavers seized control of the championship game from the opening tip and never

They also beat Pittsburg Colgan 61-48 in the first round and outscored Nemaha Valley 50-38 in the semi-finals.

The Beloit boys won the Class 3A Sub-State Tournament, which was held in Norton. They lost their first round game in the State Tournament in Hutchinson by a score of 52-50 to Silver Lake.

The Russell girls were champions of the Norton Sub-State. They defeated No.3 seed Caney Valley 50-42 in the first round but lost to No.2 seed Garden Plain 57-35 in the semi-finals. In the third place game, they played Hillsboro and lost 59-46 to finish fourth.

No.1 seed Burlington defeated Garden Plain 52-42 to win the championship and complete a perfect 26-0 season. Garden Plain finished 23-2.

The Belleville boys won the Class 2A championship in Bramlage Coliseum in Manhattan. They beat Jefferson County North 78-68 in the first round,

outscored Ness City 51-37 in the semi-finals and ended Meade's bid for an undefeated season with a 64-53 overtime victory in the finals on Saturday.

Belleville finished 23-3 and Meade fell to 24-1.

Ness City's head coach is Norton Community High School graduate Matt Overlease.

The Ness City boys were the No.7 seed and beat No. 2 seed Lyndon 53-48 in the first round before losing 51-37 to No.3 seed Belleville in the semi-finals. In the third place game on Saturday, Ness City played Moundridge, who edged them 71-68.

In Class 1A, Division I, the Stockton boys won the Osborne Sub-State Tournament. In their first game in the State Tournament in Emporia, the No.6 seeded Tigers defeated No.3 seed Hoxie 58-42 to advance to the semi-finals. In that game, sophomore Justin Wiltfong, led the way with 16 points and 11 rebounds. He was a perfect 6 of 6 from the field and 4 of 4 from the charity stripe.

Justin is the son of Norton Community High School graduate Doug Wiltfong and wife, Kelly and the grandson of Eugene and Maxine Wiltfong, Norton.

In the semi-finals, Stockton lost to No.2 seed South Haven by a score of 65-60. On Saturday, they lost to Centralia 78-47 to place fourth and end the season with a record of 18-8. No.1 seed St. John-Hudson defeated South Haven 70-50 to win the championship and end the season 25-1.

The Stockton team's head coach is Tom Stephens, a Lenora High School graduate.

The Sharon Springs boys won the Class 1A-II Sub-State championship in Colby and defeated Colony Crest 72-62 in their state tournament opener in Gross Memorial Coliseum in Hays. In the semi-finals, they lost to unbeaten and No.1 seed Fowler 75-63 and played No.3 seed White City for third. They lost a close 53-46 game to place fourth and finish with a 19-7 re-

The Golden Plains-Rexford girls won the Colby Sub-State championship and played and defeated Hope 58-43 in the first round at Hays. In the semifinals, they lost 32-29 to No.2 seed Norwich and played Wilson on Saturday for third. Golden Plains put together a solid 77-67 win to place third and end the season with a 22-3 record.

Ottawa, in Class 4A, is a team which regularly competes in and wins the boys side of the Topside Tip-Off Basketball Tournament in Goodland. The Ottawa boys played in Salina in state tournament action. They were 76-44 first round winners over Garnett-Anderson County, outscored Andale 73-49 in the semi-finals and extended their unbeaten season record to 25-0 with a state championship win of 54-45 over No.1 seed Topeka Highland Park, who finished
