# School board faces tough decisions

mstephens@nwkansas.com The Board of Education, U.S.D. 211, held its regular meeting on Monday, March 11 at the Alice Tweed Center.

Due to a possible financial shortfall of \$710,000 for the 2013-14 school year, the Board is faced with a difficult problem that may result in a painful solution; a reduction in staff.

Board member Steve Berry made a motion, which was seconded by Craig Renner, and was approved by a 5-1 vote with Robert Wyatt voting no.

"After reviewing the available budget options before us, the Board of Education has reluctantly come to the conclusion that it may be necessary to reduce staff for the 2013-14 school year. Therefore, it is with regret that I move: The Board of Education hereby directs the Superintendent of Schools (Greg Mann) to prepare a recommendation for possible district-wide staff reductions for 2013-14, and that it be presented to the Board at their regularly scheduled meeting on Monday, April 8," said Berry.

The Board unanimously accepted the

The Board also approved the Eisenhower Elementary School summer school staff that includes Kim Fiscus, Gail Roy and Teresa Schulze as teachers and Cristina Sander as secretary. Summer school will be held for two weeks after school is out in May and two weeks prior to the start of the school year in August.

The Board decided to charge a \$100 fee per student to participate in the U.S.D. 211 summer driver's education program and a fee of \$150 will be charged for students who live out of the district, and only if space is available.

The Board designated the Kansas Educator Evaluation Protocol (KEEP) as the official evaluation instrument for U.S.D. 211 and that it be implemented according to the requirements and timeline as determined by the Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE).
