Other inductees into the CCCC Athletics Hall of Fame were Denis Grahem, a native of Meriden and Garla (Chaffee) Pierson, Clay Center.

Mr. Grahem was a three-time NJCAA All-American in track and field. He finished as shot put national runner-up in both the indoor and outdoor championships in 1978. He still holds the school record for a throw of 53'7" in the outdoor shot put.

Ms. Pierson became the first Cloud County Community College track athlete to win an individual national championship when she claimed the 800 meter run in a national record time of 2:18.2 at the 1981 NJCAA Indoor meet. She also anchored the national champion 4 x 800 meter relay team in 1982.


