#### National window safety week

April 7-13 is National Window Safety Week.

Nothing says spring and summer like opening the windows, setting the table and chairs out on the porch, or planting flowers to adorn your deck. Keeping windows and doors open provides fresh air throughout the home, but it also creates a hidden danger in your home if you have little ones.

Window falls increase dramatically during the spring and summer months; however, they can be prevented. It takes supervision and a device called a window guard. "A screen is not a safety device," says Cherie Sage, Safe Kids Kansas. "It's designed to keep insects out, not to keep children in." Window guards should be installed to prevent little ones from being able to fall outside. Window guards are easy to install and should have a release mechanism in the event of an emergency or the need to move it to another window.

remember "Also, that no device replaces active supervision," said Sage. "It's the key to ensuring your child doesn't have access to open windows or doors around the home."

Window safety tips from Safe Kids Kansas:

Install window guards to prevent children from falling out of windows. For windows above the first floor, install window

guards with an emergency release device in case of fire. Install window stops so that windows open no more than

four inches. Keep windows locked and closed when they are not being used.

Keep furniture away from windows so kids cannot climb to the ledge.

If you have double-hung windows the kind that can open down from the top as well as up from the bottom it is generally safer to open the top pane, but growing kids may have enough strength, dexterity and curiosity to open the bottom pane.

Do not rely on window screens to prevent falls.

Keep windows locked when they are closed.

Supervise children at all times, especially around open windows.

Never try to move a child who appears to be seriously injured after a fall. Call 911 and let trained medical personnel move the child with proper precautions.

Check all Roman Blinds and roll up shades in your home. Kids have been strangled while playing with dangling cords. If you have looped pull cords, exposed inner cords or exposed lifting loops, then replace the blinds or shades with products that do not have exposed pull cords or inner cords.

# Tax deadlines still affecting Kansas

Changes to various federal government tax deadlines continue to impact Kansas revenue receipts, although the state is still meeting projections for the fiscal year in numbers released Friday by the Kansas Department of Revenue.

Revenue receipts for March were \$56.5 million short of projections, but the state has collected \$8.6 million more than anticipated since the July 1 start of the fiscal year. The state also has collected \$136 million more than it did during the same fiscal period last year.

Some of the state's shortfalls appear to be following a national trend. The Federation of Tax Administrators reported that

sales tax collections in February were down significantly in several states, and Kansas mirrored that with sales tax revenue receipts missing their mark by \$11.7 million. March sales tax receipts reflect sales activity in February, when multiple major winter storms hit the state.

"This is a good example of why we should show fiscal restraint with the state's spending. Sometimes actions beyond our control can have negative impacts on our state revenue receipts and we must be in a position to absorb the impact," said Revenue Secretary Nick Jordan.
