dwelling, by a unanimous vote. The Council decided to open the swimming pool for this summer. City Administrator Rob Lawson said the cracks had been sealed and it could be ready to open. By a 4-2 vote, the Council approved opening the pool for the summer, with Ron Briery and Jerry Jones vot-

The Council also passed a motion stating that the Council should determine who will be hired as pool manager and pool employees.

The Council rescinded a previous motion to tear down the Roadside Park restrooms after it was determined it wasn't an eyesore. The Parks and Inmate crews have done some work at the restrooms and it is estimated that \$500 in repairs by the City would keep the restrooms open for the summer.

City Administrator Lawson reported he met with representatives from Prairie Land Electric regarding mutual aid. They looked at two ties on the primary feeding the town for back up power. They discussed building the power lines to the City and putting on a metering package. Prairie Land's gates would be closed, but if the City lost power, Prairie Land could tie on and energize the City. The representatives also discussed voltage regulators and capacitors because the load is getting large

at the Road Substation. Prairie Land is considering putting a separate transformer in to feed the City. The City would need a load tap regulator to do this, but no changes will be made at the power plant until a report is received from the engineer.

Lawson also said he submitted an application for a third Geometric Improvement project on East Highway 36, from the intersection east for approximately 300 feet. It would be a \$750,000 grant that would require the City to pay five percent matching funds.

Frazier car club which is holding its spring meet on April 19, 20 and 21 at the Sleep Inn in




