Drought legislation signed

Governor Sam Brownback signed HB 2202, legislation to allow an automatic increase in hay truck transportation limits upon drought declaration in Kansas.

While the state has received some welcome moisture in spring 2013, Governor Brownback said drought conditions remain in all 105 counties. For the past two consecutive years, Brownback has issued executive orders to temporarily suspend certain motor carrier rules and regulations in order to expedite the delivery of hay to livestock in drought-stricken areas. HB 2202 will make these exemptions automatic upon a governor's drought declaration and will further expedite drought response and delivery efforts.

"Farmers and ranchers are at the mercy of Mother Nature and should not have to wait for an executive order to allow them to efficiently deliver hay and forage to their livestock," Governor Brownback said. "Over the past two years, my administration has continuously worked to rapidly respond to the drought but there is no room for politics in the face of a natural disaster like the ongoing drought. We cannot end this drought but we can take commonsense steps, like implementing HB 2202, to help farmers and ranchers cope with the ongoing drought situation.'

HB 2202 allows for the suspension of requirements for registration and fuel tax permits from the Kansas Department of Revenue and licensing, certification and permitting rules and regulations as required by the Kansas Corporation Commission during drought emergencies. Participating motor carriers will only be allowed to operate during daylight hours and must comply with flag, sign and lighting requirements for over-width vehicles. Additionally, participating motor carriers will not be allowed to drive during inclement weather conditions. Finally, HB 2202 does not remove the motor carrier's responsibilities to comply with the safety and commercial driver's license requirements.

HB 2202 increases the maximum width and height for trucks delivering hay to drought-stricken areas. Participating motor carriers are limited to a load that does not exceed 12 feet in width and does not exceed a height of 14 feet, six inches. Under normal circumstances, haulers are required to obtain a permit for loads exceeding 8.5 feet in width and 14 feet in height. All other applicable state and federal regulations continue to apply, including the requirement to have a valid driver's

"The Kansas Department of Agriculture is committed to supporting our state's farmers, especially in challenging situations like the drought," Kansas Secretary of Agriculture Dale Rodman said. "From fluctuating markets and regulatory uncertainty from the federal government, they face enough uncertainty. They should not also have to wonder if they will be able to deliver hay to livestock during a drought. HB 2202 will ensure our farmers and ranchers have access to the necessary tools to mitigate the effects of this ongoing drought."

Senators introduce Kelsey Smith Act

U.S. Senators Pat Roberts and Jerry Moran recently introduced the Kelsey Smith Act to aid law enforcement's response to emergencies when a person's life is threatened.

On June 2, 2007, 18-year-old Kelsey Smith was abducted in broad daylight from an Overland Park, Kansas department store and murdered. The abduction was captured on the store's security camera leaving little doubt of the emergency nature of the circumstances. Four days after she disappeared, authorities were able to locate Kelsey's body after her wireless provider released the "ping" or "call location" information from her cell phone. Providing this information as fast as possible is critical to ensure law enforcement officials can rescue victims in imminent danger of death or serious physical harm.

legislation Senator Roberts and Senator Moran introduced today will require wireless communication providers to provide call location information to the requesting law enforcement agencies only when responding to a call for emergency services or in an emergency situation that involves the risk of death or serious physical harm.

Senator Roberts and Senator Moran released the following statements after introducing the Kelsey Smith Act into the 113th Congress:

"Protecting the lives of our children is the paramount concern for any parent," Sen. Roberts said. "The Kelsey Smith Act is commonsense legislation that makes it easier for law enforcement to find our children if the nightmare of abduction ever becomes a reality. Because the fear of legal liability is a legitimate concern

our bill provides industry and law enforcement with the necessary tools to work together to do everything they can do to find a loved one in danger, while at the same time ensuring that all citizens' Fourth Amendment rights are protected. I look forward to broad, bipartisan, bicameral support of the Kelsey Smith Act."

"Kelsey Smith's abduction sent shockwaves through her community, our state and the nation," Sen. Moran said. "The Kelsey Smith Act will make certain first responders have the tools they need to help prevent tragedies like this from happening in the future."

Senators Roberts Moran joined Congressman Kevin Yoder and Congresswoman Jenkins who introduced the House companion bill.
