### What a difference a year makes

Message to gardeners: Don't judge how landscape plants will behave based on last year.

"What a difference a year makes," said Kansas State University horticulturist Ward Upham, adding that by mid-March of last year, winter honeysuckle, red maple, flowering pear, forsythia and more were in full bloom because of unseasonably warm weather early in the year. By the first of April even more plants were blooming, like apple fruiting pear, flowering dogwood and Vanhoutte spirea. But this year, the only one of those

plants that was in full bloom on April 1 was winter honeysuck-

"It's important to remember," Upham said, "that last year we were two to three weeks ahead of normal and so we might not be as far behind as it first appears. However, we are behind.'

Forsythia, for example, typically is in full bloom about the third week in March.

"Since 2005, the earliest we have seen full bloom on forsythia was March 10, 2006 and the latest was April 5, 2008," he said. "Therefore, it appears we are about two weeks behind normal and about a month behind last year."

That does not mean, however, that the spring growing season will stay two weeks behind normal, Upham added. Belownormal temperatures will cause plants to lag even further, while temperatures above-normal would allow plants to at least partially catch up.

"Regardless, it appears that 'normal' in Kansas is just an average of extremes," Upham

### PUBLIC NOTICE **ORDINANCE NO. 1638**

Published in The Norton Telegram on Tuesday, April 23, 2013

**ORDINANCE NO. 1638** AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER TWO, ARTICLE TWO, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF NORTON, AMENDING THE DOG REGISTRATION ORDINANCE WITHIN THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Section Two, Article Two of the Code of the City of Norton, Kansas, is hereby amended to read as follows: 2-203. REGISTRATION; VACCINATION; TAX

· Every owner or harborer of any dog over six months of age shall register his or her name with the name, breed, color, approximate weight, length of hair, sex and description of each dog so owned, with the City Clerk.

•Upon registration, the owner or harborer shall present a current, completed certificate of immunization against rabies. No registration shall follow without evidence of this document.

 $\bullet \text{The City Clerk shall collect an annual tax for each dog owner and harborer, within } \\$ the corporate limits of the city as follows: (1) For each neutered male or spayed female dog, the sum of \$5.00:

(2) For each male or female dog not spayed or neutered the sum of \$25.00.

d. The license shall be due each year by February 1st and shall be for the license year from February 1st though January 31st. The registration shall be required for any animal over six months of age brought in to the city on or after February 1st, or any animal attaining the age of six months on or after February 1st of any license year, and the animal shall be licensed within 30 days after being brought in to the city or attaining

Section 2: That any ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby amended.

Section 3: This ordinance shall take effect from and after the date of its publication in the official city newspaper.
