Effects of drought in western Kansas are severe, according to the April 22 Weekly Crop Report from Kansas Ag Statistics; the state's wheat crop is rated 37 percent poor to very poor, 33 percent fair and 30 percent good to excellent. According to Harries report, the wheat crop in western Kansas, largely from Highway 283 west, is abysmal. A majority of the fields will yield in the single digits; many will not even be harvested. The final results of the 2013 Winter Wheat Tour estimate Kansas wheat crops at 313 million bushels, well below last year's actual total of 360 million bushels. And the five year average of 341 million bushels.

cost of the inspector is included in the price of the pool project.

All pool bids have to be received by June 12 at 2 p.m.

City Administrator Rob Lawson reported Corner Stone Contractors will begin securing the Gower Building the week of May 6. Code Inspector Jeff Wolf notified the owner and the tenant. Council member Jerry Jones questioned whether it was safe to have people working inside the building. Wolf said the building is condemned. City Attorney Karen Griffiths said she will issue the occupant a notice to quit and the City can proceed with the repairs.

Lawson also reported that Ashley Maybon accepted the pool manager position and will hire the assistant manager and pool guards for the season. He said that clean-up week was extended due to bad weather, but everything went well. And the electric distribution and power plant employees have started changing out the series lighting in downtown.

Jon Boxler of Boxler Insurance Agency and EMC Insurance presented a dividend check for \$6,591.27 to the City of Norton. This is the 30th year the policy has been written. The Kansas Municipal Utilities Safety Group Insurance program through EMC Insurance includes over 450 cities, and a proportionate share of the total group dividend is paid out to all participants.

Dennis Becking from Options, formerly the Northwest Kansas Domestic & Sexual Violence Services, requested funding from the City of Norton to help fund its services to Norton County. The council agreed to donate \$500 to Options, to be paid from the general fund. Options provides 24 hour service within the 18 northwest Kansas counties. In 2012, Options served nine domestic violence and five sexual assault victims in Norton County.

Mayor Corns reported the city sales tax receipts collected in March of 2013 totaled \$22,857.27, and the county sales tax receipts totaled \$14,643.63 for a total of \$37,500.90. The 2013 year to date sales tax receipts total \$153,849.44.

The council also adopted a resolution supporting the Second Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, by a vote of 5-1, with Donna Foley voting no. Jones said he is not advocating the sale of guns, but rather support for the Constitution. Foley said it was unnecessary because the council agrees to uphold and defend the Constitution when they take the oath of office.
