Landmark legislation brings federal support

Administration This year is the 25th anni-

versary of the enactment of the Women's Business Ownership Act of 1988.

This Act is a landmark piece of legislation that has laid the foundation for increased federal support of one of the largest and most important segments of the nation's economy: womenowned businesses.

According to a recent report by American Express OPEN, as of 2011, there are over 8.1 million women-owned businesses in the United States, generating nearly \$1 .3 trillion in revenues and employing nearly 7.7 million people. The report also estimates that, between 1997 and 2011, women-owned firms increased by 50 percent- a rate of 1.5 times the national average.

Clearly, women-owned firms are a major force in the U.S. economy and the U.S. Small Business Administration offers a wide range of programs and services to help women establish and grow their small businesses

Small Business Administration Loan Programs

According to the Urban Institute, Small Business Administration guaranteed loans are three to five times more likely to go to women than non-Small business Administration loans. While there aren't any Small business Administration loan programs specifically for women business owners, the Small Business Administration is one of the largest loan guarantors in the country.

Rather than direct lending, the Small Business Administration provides a guarantee to banks and other participating lenders for the funds they lend to small businesses owners.

Small Business Administration offers a variety of loan programs through our participating lenders that can be used for most business purposes: to purchase or improve real estate, to purchase machinery and equipment and inventory or to assist in the acquisition, operation or expansion of an existing business. Small Business Administration also backs working capital loans and revolving lines of credit as well as loans to refinance existing debt under certain conditions.

Small Business Administration Training and Counseling

Small Business Administration's Office of Women's Business Ownership oversees more than 100 Women's Business Centers throughout the United States and its territories designed to assist women to start and grow small businesses. These centers operate with the mission to "level the playing field" for women entrepreneurs, who still face unique obsta-

cles in the world of business. Through the management and technical assistance provided by the centers, entrepreneurs are offered comprehensive training and counseling on a vast array of topics in many languages to help them start and grow their own businesses. In FY 2012 the Women's Business Centers network served 137,942 clients throughout the country and supported \$40.5 million in capital infusion (loans and equity investment).

Small Business Administration also delivers counseling and training through our network of Small Business Development Centers, SCORE and Veterans' Business Resource organizations. These organizations offer an inclusive series of relevant seminars and conferences and workshops to help get your idea for a new service or product off the ground - or take your existing enterprise to the next level. And the best part is that these services are low cost or free. Small Business Administration data has shown that businesses that receive counseling assistance have significantly better survival rates than those that don't receive similar support.

Contracting

At the Small Business Administration, one of our priorities is making sure that more qualified women-owned small businesses have access to government and commercial supply chain opportunities. That's the purpose of the Women's Contracting Rule. For the first time, federal agencies have been able to set aside contracting opportunities for women-owned small businesses

Additionally, consumers will be provided with a less expensive and more to achieve the savings included abundant food supply.

Nebraska Vocational Rehabilitation also helped Balderston with his wheelchair that is equipped with heavy duty tires, modifications so he can drive his pickup and he might be getting a flat-bed lift to get him into a tractor or combine. "If you're willing to do something, they'll help you," said Balderston.

'Duke's' first day on the job didn't go without a hitch however. He suffered a cut on his front leg and had to get stitches at a veterinarian clinic in Beaver City, Neb., but the prognosis looks good for 'Duke' and Balderston.

So far, the PHARM Dog project has placed nine dogs with farmers, including six in 2011-12, and six more placements are expected in 2013. PHARM Dog creator, Jackie Allenbrand said, "raising and training PHARM

Dogs isn't cheap." Allenbrand estimates that it costs about \$1,650 to raise a puppy, and approximately \$5,000 to train service dogs.

As far as the therapeutic benefits, Allenbrand said PHARM Dog recipients have reported lower levels of depression and stress, and traumatic brain injury survivors have shown less nausea and dizziness. "The reactions of the farmers are what you need to see and hear in order to understand the value of the program," said Allenbrand.

Service dogs, according to Allenbrand, can be trained to do a variety of things. In the case of a farmer, helpful tasks include: retrieving tools, being taught to stand and brace if a farmer had arthritis and needed help getting up, open a latch gate system, herding, and the dog could also learn to go for help when

needed.

The resources available to assist agricultural workers with disabilities come in many forms, including the four-legged kind.
