## Head on crash seriously injures two

The Kansas Highway Patrol responded to a violent head-on collision at 3:42 p.m. Monday on U.S. Highway 36, three and a half miles east of Norton, that sent four people to the hospital.

According to the Highway Patrol, 16-year-old Sabrina D. Field-Pirotte of Phillipsburg was driving a 2003

Dodge Grand Caravan westbound, and Wayne Byler, 54 of Norton, was driving a 2004 Peterbilt semi-tractor trailer eastbound. For an unknown reason the van went left of center and struck the semi head-on.

The van came to a rest facing north in the ditch and the semi jack-knifed and came to a rest facing north in the south ditch. Field-Pirotte and a twoyear-old male passenger were trans-

ported by ambulance to Norton County Hospital. Field-Pirotte was then flown to Kansas University Medical Center in Kansas City and the two-year-old was flown to Children's Mercy Hospital in Kansas City.

The two other passengers injured were Brandy Field, age 36 of Phillipsburg, and a five-year-old female who were transported to Norton County Hospital. The truck driver, Byler, was

not injured and all parties were wearing seat belts or in child safety seats, according to the Highway Patrol.

The highway was closed in both directions as emergency crews extricated the injured passengers with the "Jaws of Life." Debris from the vehicles covered both lanes of the highway and it remained closed for several

## Highway to be closed all summer near Hoxie

## Norton School board plans for the next year

The Board of Education, U.S.D. 211, held its year-end meeting on Friday, June 28 at the Alice Tweed Center. After a closed door session, the Board ratified the contract with certified staff, approved administrator bonuses of \$1,433 in lieu of salary increases, and approved increasing classified wages by \$0.25 per hour for the 2013-2014 school year.

Superintendent Greg Mann presented possible policy changes for 2013-2014 to the Board for its review. Any adoption of these changes will be considered at the July 15 meeting.


Mann also presented the personnel handbooks for 2013-2014 for the Board to study and review. The Board will its July 15 meeting as well.

The Board also approved the consent agenda which consists of the agenda for June 28, the minutes of the June 10 regular meeting, payment of bills, payroll and encumbrances. Also, authority was given to the treasurer to pay 2012-2013 end-of-year bills as may yet be received on or before July 1. Authority was given to the Board Clerk, Treasurer and Superintendent to transfer any year-end funds according to State statue and/or Kansas State Department of Education guidelines. These positions were also given the authority to utilize Contingency Reserve Funds if necessary to pay final expenses for 2012-2013.
