The young Blue Jays won the opener 12-3 and the nightcap 17-2.

Opener

After holding Atwood scoreless, Norton scored four runs in the bottom of the first inning. Layton Miller got on base on an error, Gavin Lively singled, Collyn Auker reached base on an error, Trenton Wright walked and Will Ellis walked. Miller, Lively, Auker and Wright all scored.

Atwood scored one run in the top of the second, followed by four more runs by Norton in the bottom of the second. Oren Rhea got on base on an error, Jace Ruder, Miller and Lively all singled and Auker tripled, putting Norton ahead 8-1.

Atwood tallied another run in the top of the third and Norton matched it in the bottom of the inning when Justis Posson singled and Ruder tripled him home.

The visitors' final run came in the top of the fourth stanza. Norton added a run in the bottom of the fourth when Auker slammed a triple, Ellis singled and Auker scored.

Norton scored two more runs in the bottom of the fifth inning.

Norton had 12 hits in the game, two walks and one strike out.

Coach's comments

"Overall, this was by far our best baseball of the year," said Norton K-18 head coach Rick Green.

"Atwood is a very young team and they haven't had a K-18 team for four or five years so they are only going to get better but so will we.

"Our pitchers threw a lot of strikes and, although we didn't play perfect defense, we did make the plays we needed to make. Our team hitting was much improved and we had some guys who hit the ball hard but right at the defenders.
